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# Background

The Planning Department, in collaboration with other City agencies, is developing an Environmental Justice (EJ) Framework and accompanying policies in the San Francisco General Plan. These updates are intended to meet the requirements of California Senate Bill 1000. They will also help implement provisions of the Planning Commission and Historic Preservation Commission resolutions centering the Department's work on racial and social equity<sup>1</sup>, which call for commensurate amendments to the San Francisco General Plan.

This proposed addition of Environmental Justice policies into the General Plan is one component in a series of proposed amendments to the General Plan, intended to modernize the City's central land use policy document. Other updates underway include updates to the Community Safety Element to add climate resilience; a holistic update of the Housing Element, consistent with state-mandated timing requirements; and, a holistic update to the Transportation Element, as part of the ConnectSF project. An informational overview of these changes to the General Plan has been tentatively scheduled for the November 4, 2021 hearing.

## State & Local Mandates

California Senate Bill 1000 ("SB1000") adopted in 2016 requires that cities and counties that have one or more census tracts defined as "Disadvantaged Communities" adopt policies in their General Plan to address environmental justice. ["Disadvantaged Communities" are defined as areas that are low-income and face disproportionate exposure to environmental pollution and other health hazards as shown on CalEnviroScreen, a mapping tool created by California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA) & California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) that provides tract-level data on demographics, sources of

pollution, and other health risk factors.]<sup>2</sup> Substantial progress on these updates must be underway when a jurisdiction amends two or more Elements of its General Plan after 2018.

Recognizing that environmental justice burdens fall disproportionately on Indigenous, Black, and other People of Color communities due to a long legacy of institutional and environmental racism, the Department has aligned this project with its ongoing work on the Racial & Social Equity Action Plan. In addition to implementing provisions of the Commission's resolution centering the Department's work on racial and social equity, the EJ Framework process will also yield feedback and recommendations that will help inform the upcoming Phase 2 Action Plan, anticipated in 2022 (pending Office of Racial Equity direction).

#### **Environmental Justice Framework & General Plan Policies**

In response to these mandates, the Department is working with other City agencies (including the San Francisco Department of Public Health, San Francisco Department of the Environment, and San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, among others) to develop an Environmental Justice Framework ("EJ Framework") to identify key EJ-related goals and priorities. The EJ Framework will include policy recommendations in the following topic areas, adapted from SB1000 requirements:

- Clean and Healthy Environments (Pollution Reduction<sup>3</sup>)
- Healthy Food Access
- Physical Activity
- Safe, Healthy and Affordable Housing (Safe & Sanitary Homes<sup>4</sup>)
- Healthy Public Facilities
- Empowered Neighborhoods (Civic Engagement and Prioritizing EJ Communities<sup>5</sup>)
- Climate Resilience & Justice<sup>6</sup>
- Equitable and Green Jobs<sup>7</sup>

The Environmental Justice Framework will outline a vision and policy priorities to be incorporated throughout the Elements of the City's General Plan. The first set of policies will be found in the Housing, Transportation, and Safety & Resilience Elements, which are currently undergoing updates. Subsequent phases of work will address updates to other Elements not currently scheduled for comprehensive revisions.

## Draft Environmental Justice (EJ) Communities Map

The CA Governor's Office of Planning & Research (OPR) issued guidance to jurisdictions on implementing SB1000 as part of its recent updates to State General Plan Guidelines.<sup>8</sup> The guidelines specify that jurisdictions may rely solely on a state mapping tool (CalEnviroScreen) when making their determination of where "Disadvantaged

Communities" are located. However, it notes that jurisdictions may expand upon the protective intent of SB1000 by conducting further data analysis and mapping to specify additional areas impacted by environmental justice.

The Department developed the draft Environmental Justice Communities Map ("EJ Communities Map"), due to feedback from other City agencies and community members that CalEnviroScreen does not adequately reflect the range of San Francisco neighborhoods that face environmental burdens and other health disparities. This draft EJ Communities Map is based on CalEnviroScreen 3.0<sup>9</sup> with additional local data on pollution and demographics, and it will be refined based on public feedback during the community engagement process. The Department is also developing an online Story Map that will include additional data on related topics, and information from interviews with people living and working in EJ Communities.

#### **Community Engagement Plan & Timeline**

A key principle of environmental justice is that the communities which are most impacted must have a central role in identifying needs and potential solutions. Therefore, the community engagement plan focuses primarily on partnering with community members and organizations in the neighborhoods identified in the Draft EJ Communities Map. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 public health emergency, all activities are being conducted virtually until further notice. The figures below describe the planned community engagement activities and general timeline of events.

Activity	Description & Status
Environmental Justice Working Group	The Environmental Justice Working Group is a six-month effort (June-November 2021) to bring together community and City agency leaders to co-develop recommendations for the draft EJ Framework. The 18 community leaders in the group were selected after a public recruitment process in Spring 2021, focused on representation of people living and working in the EJ Communities. (See Attachment B for membership roster; <i>Status: Ongoing</i> )
Youth Engagement	Staff conducted youth engagement with 4th graders at Malcolm X Academy in the Bayview Hunters Point neighborhood (in partnership with Y-PLAN) in Fall 2020, and with juniors and seniors at Balboa High School in the Excelsior neighborhood in Spring 2021. This included capacity-building activities where students identified strengths, challenges, and opportunities for advancing EJ in their neighborhoods. The youth delivered a presentation on their policy recommendations to staff from various City agencies. ( <i>Status: Completed</i> )
General Plan Virtual Events	The Department hosted a two-week series of virtual events in March 2021 showcasing its current and upcoming work to update key Elements of the SF General Plan. The EJ Framework was featured at two online workshops, which provided an overview of the project and solicited feedback on EJ challenges and opportunities in various neighborhoods. The events also included an overview of the Racial & Social Equity Action Plan and solicited feedback on the definitions of equity and ideas for addressing disparities. <i>(Status: Completed)</i>


#### EJ Framework Community Engagement: Completed & Planned Activities


