SoMa West will be the largest community benefit district in the City and will address cleanliness and public safety

San Francisco, CA – Mayor London N. Breed today signed legislation establishing the SoMa West Community Benefit District (CBD), the largest of the 17 CBDs citywide, to help ensure a welcoming, clean, and economically vibrant local community.

"I am focused every day on keeping every neighborhood in our city clean, safe, and vibrant," said Mayor Breed. "SoMa West CBD is the result of these neighbors, merchants, property owners, and stakeholders coming together to benefit the community for everyone who lives and works here, and I am committed to working with them to continue the progress we are making."

The SoMa West CBD was formed after a majority vote was cast by property owners in the

area based off weighted assessments, and the Board of Supervisors voted to approve the formation. It will raise approximately \$3.74 million per year in special assessments from those properties to carry out its management plan over the next 15 years. The boundaries of the District include approximately 2,765 parcels located on approximately 100 whole blocks, including blocks and partial blocks bounded by 5th Street and 6th Street on the east, Minna Street and Folsom Street on the north, South Van Ness Avenue and the U.S. Highway 101 Freeway on the west, and Townsend Street on the south.

"I'm excited that the SoMa West CBD will help provide cleaner and safer streets for the residents, and build community across the diverse neighborhood," said Supervisor Haney. "West SoMa is one of the highest needs areas in the city that deserves urgent focus and action. I'm happy to see that we were able to include a more affordable assessment for nonprofits, and a commitment to an inclusive, diverse board with broad representation from community organizations, tenants, small businesses, and property owners."

The services that the SoMa West CBD will provide include:

- Maintenance teams that sweep, scrub, and pressure wash sidewalks and public spaces to remove litter, graffiti, and trash;
- Beautification and activation improvements to make SoMa West more visually attractive, which may include green spaces, wayfinding signage, trashcans, public art programs, and public space activation programs;
- Safety improvements, which will include a pedestrian and bicycle safety program;
- Marketing and district branding to promote SoMa West as a regional destination; and
- A community grant program that will allow area nonprofits and cultural districts to apply for funding for programming.

The formation of SoMa West took more than two years of outreach and planning by property owners, businesses, renters, nonprofits, and other stakeholders looking to mirror the successes of CBDs throughout the City. Approximately 90 public informational sessions and planning meetings were held during the planning process. The steering committee included a diverse mix of 35 local merchants, property owners, renters, and area nonprofits that reflect the neighborhood. Technical assistance was provided throughout the process by the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, which will continue to work with the new CBD to ensure the smooth operation of the District and help ensure it follows all legal and community obligations.

"As a resident and service provider in the neighborhood, I am excited about the potential of the SoMa West CBD. This tremendous effort by residents, business owners, and community members has embodied United Playaz' motto, 'It takes the hood to save the hood,' and we are looking forward to the positive impact that it will have for Western Soma," said Misha Olivas, Director of Community and Family Engagement at United Playaz and a Western SoMa resident.

"Throughout the years in Western SoMa, residents, property owners, businesses, and stakeholders have wanted a safer, cleaner, and a more vibrant neighborhood. Those of us living and working here have always believed in our neighborhood. The past two years has seen the neighborhood unify and work to this goal to form the SoMa West CBD. We are all pleased to say that the SoMa West CBD will now be a reality for everyone's benefit," said James Spinello, chair of the SoMa West CBD Steering Committee. "It has been an incredible

journey listening to and hearing from our neighborhood. SoMa West CBD will be a combined effort to make our neighborhood a wonderful place to live, work, and visit. We are excited for the future and look forward to showing everyone the success of SoMa West in the years to come."

Dear Elected Officials,

I am a district 2 resident and homeowner who strongly opposes SB50 for the following reasons:

- SB 50 up-zones virtually (96%) all of San Francisco, making no allowance for differences in individual neighborhoods to adequately handle increased housing density.
- San Francisco's transportation infrastructure in totally inadequate to support the level of housing density proposed by SB50. SB50 definition of a transit corridor as a MUNI bus line is absurdly broad.

The majority of the city's northern and western neighborhoods have no fixed rail transportation at all, with all MUNI buses reliant on surface streets. Excessive traffic congestion, a double-parking epidemic, widespread potholes, numerous public works (sewer, water, etc), and construction projects make these surface streets woefully inadequate to handle current traffic loads. Even as traffic has increased in recent years, MUNI ridership has actually decreased because the service is so bad that many customers view ride sharing or individual cars as a much more attractive alternative or as a necessity (which they are to get to most places in the bay area). To assume that the increased residential population resulting from SB50 would all ride MUNI buses (something the proponents of SB 50 magically believe) is totally inconsistent with recent traffic and bus ridership trends. This lack of transportation infrastructure would only mean more cars, more pollution, more traffic, worse streets and even worse bus service. Infrastructure needs to come before increased housing density. San Francisco can't support the density levels of a New York, London, Tokyo or Paris because we lack the transportation infrastructure (i.e., effective underground mass transit) to handle the density.

- SB 50 would result in the loss of numerous residential areas due to higher density and the elimination of single family zoning. These residential areas are important to the character of the city and are consistent with the city's current infrastructure.
- SB 50 would allow developers (without any community input) to make zoning decisions. Zoning decisions should remain in the hands of the local communities, who are in a position to assess the broader environmental, community, transportation, infrastructure and neighborhood impacts of a project. Developers have no long term interest or commitment to the community and should not be given this zoning "blank check".
- The combination of SB50 with the State Density Bonus and the Housing Accountability Act would allow increased heights of up to 70 feet in residential areas and up to 75 feet in commercial districts. Additionally, if developers include a certain percentage of affordable housing in their project, besides the increased height and density, they would be allowed three exemptions from current building codes. These provisions would result in mega-projects within existing neighborhoods that are totally out of character with those existing neighborhoods with no recourse to the local community.
- Pollution will increase and pedestrian, bicyclist and motorist safety will be reduced due to even greater car traffic, as San Francisco's lack of transportation infrastructure (see above) will only encourage (but effectively force) the occupants of these new projects to have or use cars (as there is no other viable option).

SB 50 would be a major mistake for California and an even bigger mistake for San Francisco. It doesn't address the housing affordability issue and would seriously negatively impact the character of our neighborhoods and the quality of life in San Francisco.

I am writing to you as a long time resident of San Francisco to urge you to do whatever you can to kill Scott Weiner's latest version of housing legislation. SB 50.

This proposed legislation is so awful, I hardly know where to begin. First of all, if passed it is state legislation, so I presume it would trump local legislation and ordinances, just the way that Federal law normally prevails over State law.

Its provision focus on areas that are "transit-rich" and by his definitions, almost all of SF is transit rich. There would be no density controls anywhere in San Francisco. Developers could pick and choose properties and build high rises wherever they felt like,

and everywhere claim there is a great view of something. You could basically forget San Francisco as a place to have children and raise a family. There would be no more RH 1, or RH 2. you might as well forget the concept of residential zoning. I mention the importance to me

of San Francisco as a place to raise a family because that is what my husband and I did. Starting in 1978, we have lived in several different areas of the city, both ,sometimes as renters and sometimes as owners. Like Sen Weiner, I am originally from an urbanized area of the East Coast, and when

I came to the Bay Area for education, I was startled the pleasant environment of regular homes in SF, real neighborhoods with a strong history, and the closeness of an outdoor environment. Our two sons were born and raised in San Francisco.

Despite the expense of living here, and the modest salary paid by my husband's employer, We resisted doing what other families did, ie move to Marin or the East Bay.

What is going on now in San Francisco, and what will be exacerbated by SB 50 reminds me of what happened to the Fillmore area under Justin Hermann and so called federal "redevelopment"

The Story of the era is well told in a documentary film made for KQED by filmmaker Joel Stein, which was screened at the Western Addition Library recently The higher ups were free to ignore local inputs and just leveled and threw away vast portions of the old Victorian stock in the name of progress.

The film is entitled Fillmore. I highly recommend this film. It so well documents what was lost. Even Willie Brown is interviewed in the movie about the area. I highly doubt Sen Weiner has seen the movie, or that he even cares about the issues raised.

What amazes me is that he was elected to represent San Francisco in the State Senate, but he does not actually represent what is best for San Francisco In fact, if enacted it has the potential to ruin San Francisco as a good place for families to live.

The hidden intent os SB 50 is to allow an unlimited number of units per lot. almost all of San Francisco would be up zoned. Over time this will forever change the character of the San Francisco.

SB 50 does nothing to create a solution to the problem of the mismatch that has been going on in the Bay Area between employer workplace creation and employer housing creation. We can see this rbrty workfday in all the huge buses picking up highly paid employees in S F and driving them down the peninsula.

The employers are building magnificent office buildings, but not housing. SB 50 does not force suburban communities to contribute their fair share and building more housing instead of office space, The tech employers pay their employees outrageous sums and money, give them free food and free rides.

The condition of some young techies with tons of money is about to be increased as some new IPOs take off and new millionaires are created. This is about to create more upward pressure on prices, and it is the market that developers will build for.

I am writing this letter to you today, because it is my understanding the issue of SB 50 will come before the planning commission tomorrow, Thursday March 14.

Because we are unable to attend the SF Planning Commission hearing today, my husband and I write to inform you of our strong opposition to SB 50. My husband and I are residents and home owners on Green Street in Cow Hollow. We moved with our school-age children to the Cow Hollow neighborhood six years ago and even in that relatively short time have seen the devastating effect of mega development in our neighborhood.

Scott Wiener's proposed <u>State legislation SB</u> 50 eliminates ALL local control over height, bulk and design guidelines within our neighborhoods. No Supervisors, Planning Commission, or Mayor can override if enacted. This bill will raise allowable heights from the 35/40 ft. to anywhere from 45 ft. to 110 ft. This law could be the single biggest threat to San Francisco's livability and property values.

SB 50 will impact most heavily RH-1 and RH-2 zoned properties which are 72% of SF housing. Anybody with homes within a 1/4 mile of public transit or near "transit streets with specific widths" can expect new height allowance from 4 1/2 to 10 stories tall (counting bonuses heights and other factors per Planning Department's analysis). This would end the decades long protection of 40 ft. height limit in residential areas and most commercial corridors.

Allowing building height limits to be increased in RH-1 zoned properties would create a catastrophic situation in our neighborhood. It would encourage and continue to support developers buying up residential properties and building monster projects with little to no regard for neighborhood character. It would mean the *entire* district in which we live could become a stretch of high-rise buildings with little or no open space.

SB 50 is far from a narrowly tailored approach to creating additional residential properties in our city. We understand that there are currently 58,000 parcels of property that are currently purchased and entitled /approved for development, but are stalled because of the high cost of building. Instead of focusing on supporting ways to implement these projects and increase affordable housing, SB 50 simply turns the keys of our city to developers who have a demonstrated history of creating high-end luxury projects, not affordable housing in high density business areas.

We love San Francisco and instead of leaving the City when it came time for our children to begin elementary school, we committed to raising them here. We are hoping we can stay, but if our neighborhood is destined to become a construction zone and then a high-rise dense district, we will be forced to reevaluate our decision. We appeal to our elected officials to represent the interests of the people who actually live, work and raise their families in their districts, rather than the interests of real estate developers and others, by opposing SB 50.

Dear Commissioners:

CCHO has not yet taken a formal position to support or oppose SB50.

However, the definition of "Sensitive Communities" is of primary concern, as well as whether the policy will be an indefinite deferral giving self-determination for these communities that have faced decades of disinvestment and redlining, and now face a crisis of evictions and displacement, to decide for themselves on development incentives that exacerbate real-estate speculation.

For reference, we include the Planning Department's own **Community Stabilization Strategy** Fact Sheet, which includes the definitive map of communities <u>at-risk of</u>

<u>displacement</u> or <u>facing ongoing and advanced gentrification</u>. CCHO expressed before the CASA Steering Committee that any upzoning measures need to sort out the definition so that one way or another they cover the areas of San Francisco that are experiencing gentrification, displacement, and high rates of evictions (this question also affects other at-

risk communities in the Bay Area not covered in the MTC map, such as the Canal District in San Rafael).

The analysis developed by UC Berkeley's Urban Displacement Project, which is now incorporated into the SF Planning Department's Community Stabilization Strategy, should be the basis for any "sensitive communities" deferral. The latest MTC/SB50 map greatly differs from SF's own Community Stabilization Strategy map. West SoMa (except for the census tract containing the jail), parts of greater Chinatown, much of the Mission (except for the census tracts containing the two public housing developments), parts of Bayview/Third Street corridor and of Western Addition, the Portola district, parts of the Castro and much of Inner Richmond, identified as sensitive communities in the UC Berkeley analysis and incorporated by the SF Planning Department, are left out in the MTC map. In other words, heavily working-class and communities of color, currently at risk of or facing advanced gentrification, rent burden and evictions, are ignored in the current SB50 maps.

Dear San Francisco Planning Commissioners:

On Dec 3rd 2018 Senator Scott Wiener introduced <u>SB-50</u> in an attempt to bring back most of the zoning legislation contained in <u>SB-827</u>, which was defeated last year. This is a one-size-fits all bill for California that without doubt will negatively impact 96% of San Francisco. San Francisco is my home. I have also maintained my businesses and multiunit residential property here for 38 years.

I am writing to inform you that I stand in direct opposition to Senator Wiener's bill SB 50. I ask that you read SB 50 for yourself and strongly oppose it in its entirety.

There is no credible evidence to support the seriously flawed proposal that SB 50 will solve the California housing problem. *Furthermore, it disproportionately hurts San Francisco*. SB 50 rewards unchecked speculation, kills cherished neighborhoods and significantly worsens housing affordability. The Senator's overly simplistic, naïve and sophomoric "one size fits all" approach to California housing will destroy California's renowned community diversity. Apparently, Mr. Wiener feels that 1960's area Soviet style high density urban planning is the solution for California in 2019. He needs to get to work for California instead of trying to jam his political sideshow down California's throat.

The last thing California and especially my home town San Francisco needs is another bonus to the real estate

speculators and that's exactly what SB 50 will do.

State Senator Scott Wiener's SB 50 legislation, after last year's defeated SB 827, claims to help solve California's housing crisis and create more "affordable housing," yet this bill will actually do more for luxury builders than anyone else. Apparently, Senator Weiner thinks people will not read the large print: the primary backers include real estate developers and technology companies. Follow the money – that is what SB 50 is about.

SB 50 prescribes an overwrought, unnecessarily heavy-handed and unprecedented preemption of local zoning, all in a vain attempt to solve an affordable housing shortage.

SB 50's usurping of local control over zoning laws is keyed to a property's proximity to public transit, and in San Francisco, that affects 96% of the parcels.

SB 50 eliminates RH-1 and RH-2 designations; instead all properties will be zoned as RTO (Residential Transit Oriented). This means new projects will have no density controls or parking requirements, and there is an incentive to demolish, merge lots and rebuild with luxury condos with a few token tiny, affordable units.

As you know, if a project includes these affordable units, it allows the developers to increase the height beyond current zoning limits and "pick and choose exemptions for themselves from the otherwise applicable local building limits": height, density, setbacks, lot mergers, parking, massing, exposure, rear yards, floor-area ratio, demolition, design standards and impact fees. Imagine if you live in San Francisco and the house next door or across the street to you is now replaced by a seven (7) story high-rise, densely packed with units, with no light wells, covering the entire lot, and offering no parking -- all in a building with a 75-foot width.

SB 50 eviscerates local zoning rules by turning them over to Sacramento's legislated one size fits all preemptions.

Additionally, what little light, air, privacy, view, rear-yard open space and parking remains surrounding San Francisco homes and apartments will be lost if SB 50 passes.

As a tax paying citizen, California resident and businessman, I ask that you read SB 50 for yourself and strongly oppose it in its entirety. At the very least, please take a brief look at the addendum below for what lurks behind SB50.

ADDENDUM:

Thank you for your consideration.

Nearly all of San Francisco is near transit and can be upzoned under SB 50. How much density, height and congestion increases can one city bear before they destroy what made it so desirable in the first place?

96% of San Francisco eligible for upzoning. Residential development that is either within ½ mile of the Muni Metro, BART, Ferry or Cable Cars or ¼ mile from a frequently-serviced bus stop will be eligible -- <u>SF Planning Department analysis of SB 50</u>. The hidden consequence of this bill is the impact on our neighborhood from combining SB 50 and other existing housing bills (<u>State Density Bonus</u> and <u>Housing Accountability Act</u>). That would allow increased heights up to 70' in residential areas and up to 75' in our commercial districts

SB 50 puts developers in charge of their own planning. Cities will have NO planning power and neighbors will have

NO say. If developers include a certain percentage of affordable housing in the project, they can choose, in addition to increased height and density, three (3) exemptions from building codes. Here's a small sample of local development standards, design and planning tools they can choose from:

- **Remove setbacks**: No more areas for trees, green belts, and side yards.
- **Reduce floor area ratio**: Building size/density can grow 47% to 297%.
- **Eliminate environmental sustainability**: Any development standard adopted by a city that isn't state law can be ignored by developers.
- **Remove onsite open-space:** Courtyards and balconies can be omitted.
- **Allow demolition**: Developers can demolish all buildings not on the California Registry of Historic Places. Most city building are not eligible, and of those that are, most are not registered.
- Remove exposure requirements: Allow windows that inhumanely stare at a wall.
- **Encourage lot mergers**: Up to 150 linear feet of frontage and possibly no limit with the State Density Bonus. **Eliminates single-family zoning.** SB 50 overturns single-family zoning in areas that are "above median income, jobsrich with good public schools" and lack major transit. Local RH-1, RH-2, RH-3 and many other residential zoning codes will no longer apply.

Rewards construction of up to 75 foot towers next to single-family homes. SB 50 encourages 75-foot luxury towers in single-family areas that are either close to transit or close to jobs and good schools. The limit is NOT 45 and 55 feet, as Wiener falsely says in SB 50, due to its interface with other state legislation (State Density Bonus). Up to 7-story buildings will be in areas currently zoned 4-stories if multiple zoning laws are combined and applied.

Cities can't stop a luxury tower unless the project hurts public safety. SB 50 is weaponized by the Housing Accountability Act of 1982, quietly amended by local politicians Nancy Skinner and Scott Wiener in 2017. It bans cities from rejecting any "density bonus" project unless the development "puts public health and safety at risk, or on any property listed in the California Register of Historical Resources." Therefore the onus is on the neighbors to claim and prove the risk. Otherwise the project proceeds.

Demolition. Local anti-demolition laws are honored, BUT if the demolition of a home would result in even one more housing unit than what presently exists on the parcel, the demolition must be allowed. San Francisco's local demolition laws will be null and void.

Zero parking requirement. This bill encourages severe density increases with no associated parking, on the assumption that everyone will ride public transit. There's been a decrease in public transportation ridership of 20%. In reality, the lack of parking will only clog the streets and highways with more Uber and Lyft cars.

Turns developers into the fox guarding the rental hen-house. SB 50 utterly fails to protect renters. While it purports to temporarily prevent developers from razing "rental housing," only cities who keep a register of their renters can stop developers from misstating who lives there.

SB 50 does nothing to address the infrastructure plans and costs that will be needed to accommodate all these **new developments.** How will California plan and pay for the increased needs of utilities such as sewer, water and power plus public transportation, schools, fire and police, parks, wear and tear on the the roads and all aspects of infrastructure from this dramatic increase in housing in the U.S.'s already most populated state? SB50 provides no

funding whatsoever for all of this. Instead, it foists all those expenses on the cities and communities.

Our San Francisco elected representatives Scott Wiener, Phil Ting and David Chiu are claiming to help solve California's housing crisis with a statewide, one-size-fits-all solution. Meanwhile they are pushing through legislations that hurts the very city they were sent to Sacramento to protect.

There is a housing problem, but the issue is AFFORDABLE housing (low, moderate and middle income), and this bill does nothing to guarantee this type of housing will be built. In fact, on the contrary, it will encourage a proliferation of market rate, million-dollar condos that do nothing to address the problem, meanwhile seriously impacting the local character of our neighborhoods - the very reason many chose to live here and tourists love to visit.

In San Francisco we currently have over 58,000 parcels of property that have been purchased and fully entitled/approved for development, but nothing is happening due to the high cost of building. SB 50 does nothing to provide funding for or subsidizing of housing. And with the estimated thousands of new millionaires from the
IPOs of Uber, Lyft, AirBnB, Pinterest, etc. who want to live in San Francisco, there's added motivation for developers to use SB 50 to focus on luxury properties at the expense of the purpose of the bill -- affordable housing. There is no reason to expose 96% of San Francisco to virtually unlimited development just because the real estate developers and tech companies, their funded organization (YIMBYs) and our elected representatives Scott Wiener, Phil Ting, and David Chiu say so.

Nicholson, a 25-year veteran of the Department who currently serves as Deputy Chief of Administration, will be the first LGBT Chief of the San Francisco Fire Department

San Francisco, CA — Today Mayor London N. Breed announced that Deputy Chief Jeanine Nicholson will serve as the next San Francisco Fire Chief. Deputy Chief Nicholson is a 25-year veteran of the Fire Department and will be the first LGBT Fire Chief of the San Francisco Fire Department, and the second woman to run the Department, following Chief Joanne Hayes-White.

In addition to her current position as Deputy Chief of Administration, Deputy Chief Nicholson has served the Department in various capacities on both the fire side and the EMS side. She has been a Firefighter, a Paramedic, a Lieutenant, a Captain and a Battalion Chief. In her current role as Deputy Chief of Administration, Deputy Chief Nicholson oversees a number of

Divisions, including Support Services, Homeland Security, Human Resources, Investigative Services, and Assignment/Personnel Offices.

Deputy Chief Nicholson sustained second degree burns at an arson fire on Felton Street in 2009 where five other firefighters were also injured, one critically. She is also a breast cancer survivor. Due to these and other experiences, she not only understands all the risks that firefighters face but she has worked hard during her career to ensure that others do not have to endure what she went through.

"Deputy Chief Nicholson is a dedicated public servant and a tremendous leader and I can think of no better person to serve as our next Fire Chief," said Mayor Breed. "Her experience and her resiliency have prepared her to lead the men and women who are out there every day protecting our residents, and I am confident she will be ready to lead the Department on day one. I also want to thank Chief Joanne Hayes-White for her service and her support as we go through this transition process."

"I am honored and humbled to take on the position of Fire Chief for the San Francisco Fire Department," said Deputy Chief Nicholson. "San Francisco is an incredible city with unique challenges resulting from our dense urban environment and our ever-present earthquake risk. I am committed to meeting these challenges and continuing the work to make our City safer for all residents. The history of displacement in Japantown and the Fillmore makes the issue of housing abundance, affordability, and stability one of marked importance to District 5. Haight-Ashbury Neighbors for Density, a group of pro-housing and pro-transit neighbors, demands solutions commensurate with the scale of the crisis.

Dear Planning Commissioners:

As <u>long-time proponents of accessory dwelling units</u>, SPUR supports Supervisor Safa's efforts to further amend the planning code to make more accessory dwelling units possible in San Francisco. While this proposed legislation does not fully bring San Francisco's code into alignment with state law, it takes a few key steps toward that outcome, allowing in-law units to be created in new construction, removing discretionary review and limiting the time for appeals to the Board of Appeals. These changes would all be helpful within the San Francisco context, even if the streamlined "ministerial" process still only applies to certain ADU applications.

I urge you to allow in-law units to be included in new construction, which is the time when it will be least expensive and easiest to create the unit, rather than requiring a homeowner to go through a separate design, approval, building permit and construction process to retrofit the building later.

This will also bring San Francisco into alignment with state law in that respect.

The new development brings 83 newly built affordable homes to the South of Market neighborhood

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed, Supervisor Matt Haney and community leaders today celebrated the grand opening of new 100 percent affordable housing at 1036 Mission Street for low-income families, with nearly half of the apartments set aside for those experiencing homelessness.

"Creating new affordable housing is critical to ensuring that our low-income residents can continue to live in San Francisco," said Mayor Breed. "This project will not only create 43 new homes for low-income residents, it also creates 40 new exits for people experiencing homelessness. We need more housing of all types in our City, and I am committed to making

sure that we continue to build housing like this throughout San Francisco."

This new development provides 43 low-income families and 40 formerly homeless families with a safe, high-quality and permanently affordable place to call home. In addition, there are two on-site social workers funded by the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing.

"The need for affordable housing is immense, and the lasting impact it can have on the formerly homeless and their families is undeniable. We hope that more projects like this can happen across the city," said Supervisor Haney.

"We are thrilled to celebrate the opening of this critical asset for the SoMa community. 1036 Mission Street is a beautifully-designed, transit-friendly and permanently affordable apartment building that offers vulnerable families the stability they need and deserve," said Kate Hartley, Director of the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development.

Building features include an outdoor courtyard, a rooftop vegetable garden, a community room and kitchen, disability-accessible units, bicycle storage, 24-hour desk clerk, and a public art installation by local artist Jim Campbell. Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation is the owner, developer, service provider, and property manager for 1036 Mission Street.

"Delayed but not stymied by the Great Recession and ten years in the making, 1036 Mission Street is a testament to perseverance and an entire community's coming together to support affordable housing. As a result, more than 80 families—half of whom are moving out of homelessness—have a place to call their own," said Don Falk, Chief Executive Officer of Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation.

The City invested over \$19 million into this much-needed affordable housing. Additional funding was provided by the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development, CHASE Community Development Banking, Enterprise Community Partners, the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco, and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

San Francisco, **CA**—Today the San Francisco Housing Authority (SFHA) received notice from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that SFHA is in default of various agreements and obligations owed to HUD. The notice requires that the City assume responsibility for the essential functions currently being performed by SFHA.

"My first priority is to ensure that the 14,000 households that rely on the Housing Authority subsidies keep their housing. At the same time, I am also committed to ensuring that the Housing Authority's employees are not unfairly harmed by the actions of the Housing Authority, and that the City meet the obligations HUD has outlined. The time has come for real transformation of the Housing Authority to ensure both long term housing stability for our residents, and to continue moving forward with our multi-year effort to rebuild and transform distressed public housing communities. My office and City departments will be working

closely with the Housing Authority during this transition to ensure our residents are protected."

During this transition, the City will continue to work collaboratively with HUD to ensure the financial stability of SFHA's housing choice voucher and public housing programs. Approximately 14,000 households rely on housing vouchers. In addition, the City's HOPE SF program is currently focused on rebuilding approximately 1,400 units of distressed public housing.

MAYOR LONDON BREED ANNOUNCES PLAN FOR 80 NEW SHELTER BEDS AT TWO NAVIGATION CENTERS

Along with new SAFE Navigation Center site identified on the Embarcadero, these 80 beds will help achieve Mayor's goal of creating 500 new beds by summer

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed today announced that 80 new beds will be added to two existing Navigation Centers to provide more spaces for unsheltered residents to get access to shelter and services. These 80 beds are a part of the Mayor's efforts announced in October to add 1,000 new shelter beds by the end of next year, and 500 beds by this summer.

The 80 new beds will be created by adding a structure with 60 beds at the Division Circle Navigation Center and adding 20 beds to the Civic Center Navigation Center. This will bring the capacity of Division Circle to 186 beds and Civic Center to 112. The new shelter beds will be open by this summer.

"Every new bed we add gets one more person off the street and connects them with the services they need to stabilize and hopefully exit homelessness," said Mayor Breed. "We have

to keep pushing to add more shelter beds. I am committed to finding more sites for these centers, to passing a Shelter Crisis Ordinance to eliminate the bureaucracy that gets in the way of these badly needed shelters, and to securing more funding to help people get off the streets. That is how we will make a difference in our city."

The Mayor has already opened a combined 212 beds at the new Bryant Street Navigation Center and Bayshore Navigation Center towards meeting her 1,000 bed goal. On Monday, she announced a proposal to build a 200-bed SAFE Navigation Center at Seawall Lot 330 on the Embarcadero.

"Mayor Breed has shown extraordinary leadership to address the needs of unsheltered people in San Francisco," said Jeff Kositsky, Director of Homelessness and Supportive Housing. "This expansion of our shelter systems will help an additional 4,000 people each year on their path toward permanent housing."

Funding for these new shelters will come from already allocated funding in the current year's budget with support from the recent State windfall funding known as the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF).

The City, through the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, currently offers temporary shelter to 2,500 people per night through traditional shelters, stabilization beds, Navigation Centers, and transitional housing. In addition, they house 9,000 people per night through Permanent Supportive Housing.

"St. Vincent de Paul Society of San Francisco is very excited to help support the Mayor's goal to grow services by increasing the bed count for those who are currently unhoused," said Shari Wooldridge, Executive Director of Society of St. Vincent de Paul Society-San Francisco. "We are pleased to add 60 additional beds to the Division Circle Navigation Center. In partnership with the HSH department we will be able to assist up to 186 guests in total per night. We are happy to serve more individuals with life-saving programs that end the cycles of homelessness."

Last month, Mayor Breed introduced legislation to declare a shelter crisis in San Francisco, which would allow the City to take more immediate action to address the homelessness crisis by streamlining administrative, contracting, building, and planning code red tape that delays the construction of new shelters and the delivery of services to those in need. The legislation has been approved by the Planning Commission and the Building Inspection Commission and will be heard at the Land Use Committee of the Board of Supervisors on Monday.

Please note that at the Planning Commission meeting on Feb. 21, Commissioner Myrna Melgar voted "no" on "approval with conditions". She talked about the uniqueness of Bernal and mentioned the traffic problems going from Mission to the Bay Shore. Several Commissioners spoke on the building design be reworked again. A Bernal person spoke on how the 3 stories will impact her house in terms of sunshine. One Commissioner found it difficult to understand a roof patio and a deck on one of the condominiums. Another talked about dinning often at the Liberty Café and wanting the uniqueness of the street not to change. I turned in over 200 signatures asking for two stories instead of three.

Provisional permit means some changes are in order. I urge you to take a position on limiting the height*. By allowing two stories instead of three floors you would have one apartment underground, one business floor, and one condominium. I doubt that any of the rents will be affordable—including the business. We do not want a Subway or McDonalds on our street. Those folks can pay the outrageous rents.

My heart goes out to the many folks who are being moved out of Bernal—working class folks--janitors, cooks, waitresses, artists, musicians, teachers and retirees. Our diversity makes Bernal livable and enjoyable.

I visited Copy Central -3181 Mission St.- where a young businesswoman has worked 9 to 10 hours a day 7 days a wk. for the past 8 yrs. She has been on a month to month lease. She is paying over \$3,500 a month. She works herself for she cannot afford help. She is walking away and closing her business at the end of the month. She indicates she can't sell the business because she doesn't have a lease and can't continue to pay the new rent for the months it might take to find a buyer. WHAT IS GOING ON HERE?! It is my understanding that many business spaces are kept vacant for a tax write off and Sup. Paskin is attempting to do something about that. How long will Copy Central be empty?

One more note: a building at 317 Cortland was given a 3 story permit a few years ago. The business on the bottom went out of business and has been closed for over a year. I am trying to determine the cost of renting that space. The two apartments on top rent for \$3,500 a month. It was on the market last March for 2.8 million.

Attached, please find a visual summary of the housing development pipeline as of the fourth quarter of 2018 (Q4). At the end of the fourth quarter of 2018, there were some **70,960 net new units in the pipeline**.

- About **8,070 net units are under construction**. An additional **8,780** net units are in projects that have building permits to start construction and building permit applications have been filed for projects with about **6,250** units. These units **about 23,100** in total **are expected to be completed in the coming five years.**
- Of projects that have received Planning entitlement, there are 29,360 net new units in major, multi-phased projects. Candlestick Point, Treasure Island and Parkmerced have all started initial phases and those units are counted in the appropriate construction development stages.
- About 14,380 net new units are in projects under review. These are projects that have filed for Planning entitlement or for building permits that have yet to receive Planning Department approval. Of these units, a total of 4,000 are in two major, multi-phased projects.
- There are 13,600 affordable net units in the pipeline, or about 19%. This number is expected to grow as projects under review, as well as some entitled projects, that are subject to the affordable inclusionary requirement have yet to determine the options and number of affordable units to be provided.

This informational flyer also illustrates a ten-year housing production trend covering the first quarter of 2009 (Q1) through the fourth quarter of 2018 (Q4).

- Of the **26,760** net new units built in ten-year reporting period, **7,170** net new units or **27%** were affordable.
- The ten-year annual average during this period is about 2,680 net new units.


