MAYOR LONDON BREED ON IMPLEMENTATION OF STATE EDUCATOR VACCINATION PLAN

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed today issued the following statement regarding San Francisco's implementation of the State's educator vaccination plan. The State is providing prioritization access codes to county Offices of Education throughout California to then be distributed through local school districts and private and parochial schools to educators to sign up for vaccinations. Since San Francisco does not have a County Office of Education, the City has been seeking clarity on how these codes would be received locally, and last night the City finalized the distribution plan with the State.

"Last night, we received our first vaccine priority access codes from the State for our educators who are in the classroom or who are heading back soon. We've distributed this first set of codes to the San Francisco Unified School District for distribution to public school educators and support staff, including charter schools, that are slated to return to the classroom first, and the San Francisco Department of Public Health is working directly with our parochial and private schools to make sure their teachers who are teaching in person have access. These codes can be used to schedule appointments at Moscone Center and other Bay Area sites now. While these access codes are meant to prioritize those teaching in person or those returning to the classroom soon by opening reserved appointments only, all educators can continue to have access to vaccination appointments as they have had since last week.

While we know that vaccines are not a requirement for our schools to reopen, we also know

that moving to vaccinate teachers is a priority and we are appreciative of Governor Newsom's support in helping us meet this goal. We still need a clear timeline from the District on reopening. All of our kids need to be back in the classroom safely as soon as possible, and that includes working to get them back in five days a week for full days as soon as possible. We've lost so much this year, and we have to do everything we can to get that done."

MAYOR LONDON BREED AND RIPPLE FOUNDER CHRIS LARSEN ANNOUNCE NEW NEIGHBORHOOD MERCHANT CORRIDOR FUNDING INITIATIVE: "AVENUE GREENLIGHT"

With an initial \$1.7 million in private funding, locally focused grants will support merchant corridors in San Francisco through a variety of neighborhood cleaning, safety, and beautification projects

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed and Ripple Founder Chris Larsen today announced the launch of a new philanthropically-funded initiative to promote small business economic recovery and community vibrancy in San Francisco. The initiative, "Avenue Greenlight," will deploy privately donated dollars to San Francisco merchant associations to be used for projects to improve commercial corridors. Larsen, a San Francisco resident, business leader, philanthropist, and co-founder of locally-based blockchain payment system company Ripple Labs Inc., is contributing \$1.7 million to launch the effort in partnership with the San Francisco Council of District Merchants Associations (SFCDMA) and other community stakeholders.

Over the coming months, all 34 of San Francisco's merchants associations will individually receive a \$50,000 grant of new resources allocated from Avenue Greenlight, starting with the Castro, Bayview, Chinatown, and Clement Street commercial corridors. Grants will total \$1.7

million and will be administered in a tiered format with three to four new merchant association grants released each subsequent month moving forward based on diversity, equity, and inclusion considerations.

"Now more than ever we need everyone to step up and support their neighbors," said Mayor Breed. "Getting through this pandemic is going to take all of us working to together, and Chris Larsen's commitment to this city we all love serves as a great example for others to follow. Our small businesses are struggling and we are doing everything in our power to ensure that San Francisco comes out of this pandemic seven stronger than before. Supporting our commercial corridors with the programs funded by Avenue Greenlight, along with our ongoing City investments, will help keep small businesses intact and thriving."

Avenue Greenlight is designed to respond to persistent challenges faced by commercial corridors, including the decline in business due to COVID-19 and the recent shift toward neighborhood-targeted property crimes. Avenue Greenlight complements the City's ongoing efforts to invest in San Francisco neighborhoods and support commercial corridors. These efforts include San Francisco's Invest in Neighborhoods Initiative, which seeks to strengthen small businesses, improve physical conditions, increase quality of life, and build community capacity. It also includes efforts like the City's Shared Spaces program, which has created outdoor dining in neighborhoods all across the City, and which the Mayor has committed to extending elements of beyond the pandemic. The philanthropic model of Avenue Greenlight recognizes the need for collaboration across sectors in San Francisco to meet the needs of residents and recover as a city.

The impetus for Avenue Greenlight came from an acknowledgement on the part of Larsen that while San Francisco neighborhoods are composed differently, together they make up a truly special place to live and work, and that the success of the small business community is tied to the success of San Francisco as a whole. Small businesses are reeling as a result of compounding issues, many accelerated by the public health crisis. Further, many merchant corridors may not have the resources or ability to establish Community Benefit Districts.

The ultimate goal of Avenue Greenlight is to uplift local small businesses to help them adapt and recover from the current challenges. Direct investments like these \$50,000 grants with wraparound support will help catalyze new thinking for how residents envision their neighborhoods, and result in improved safety, cleanliness, and community vibrancy and resiliency.

"Our neighborhoods are not created equal and many suffer from systematic barriers and underrepresentation," said Chris Larsen. "I believe San Francisco is poised for an exciting new chapter when we bounce back from this pandemic, and it is this city where people will want to be. If we come together, move from empathy to action, tangible impact can be made from a modest infusion of private resources put directly into the hands of those who need it and know how to use it, and we will get there."

As Avenue Greenlight advances each month with new rounds of grantees, the SFCDMA will evaluate progress and fine-tune elements of the program to ensure its effectiveness. Avenue Greenlight will also provide an online platform for local engagement, to generate new neighborhood projects, tell the story of San Francisco neighborhoods, and enable residents to participate in shaping the fabric of their communities.

The San Francisco Council of District Merchants Associations Community Fund will serve as the 501(c)3 administrative partner and fiscal agent for Avenue Greenlight. The SFCDMA will determine the prioritization of grant recipients, manage the initiative's day-to-day operations and direct communications with merchants and residents, and help guide each individual merchant association as they develop their local projects and create tailored spending plans for each corridor. They will also connect merchant associations to a range of City and nonprofit resource organizations throughout the city to support design and implementation.

"We applaud the commitment of prominent individuals like Chris Larsen to believe in our merchants, especially right now when they need it most," said Maryo Mogannam, President of the San Francisco Council of District Merchants Associations. "We stand ready to work alongside Mayor Breed and Chris Larsen to support our diverse neighborhoods, and we are excited to roll out critical new resources in an equitable and creative way that energizes merchants and delivers community vitality for local residents."

Avenue Greenlight funds can be used for a range of projects, including a merchant association establishing a 501(c)3 to provide infrastructure; developing beautification and public open space projects, parklets, public art installations, lightning, greening, growing the urban canopy, banners and crosswalk painting, environmental design; creating access to business growth capital, emergency funding for vandalism; conducting cleanliness surveys, sidewalk cleaning services, modern litter receptacles; expanding SafeCity community camera program and public safety ambassadors; and providing a funding base for a merchant association to leverage additional member dues, marketing and promotion for shop local activations.

In addition to the Office of Economic and Workforce Development's long-standing programs to help businesses and Community Benefit Districts, the City has leveraged private funding to support businesses and neighborhoods throughout the city. In March 2020, Mayor Breed established City's Give2SF COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund, which has raised \$32.3 million and provided philanthropic funding for small businesses throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Over the last year, San Francisco has directed more than \$24 million in grants and loans to support more than 1,200 small businesses, and has developed a \$62 million plan to provide ongoing relief and recovery support to small businesses.

Dear Commissioners,

The San Francisco Land Use Coalition (SFLUC) was formed to take a proactive role in developing solutions to unabating land use issues that are causing irreparable damage to our city. Among our goals are protection of historic resources.

We are asking that you remove the Observation Wheel from the Music Concourse. This brightly-lighted, intrusive structure does not belong in a park that is so important to San Franciscans who love nature and the peace and beauty of Golden Gate Park.

The Observation Wheel was installed to 'celebrate the 150th Anniversary of Golden Gate Park.' That event, like so many other activities, was truncated by COVID and is now ending. Yet, the Department of Recreation and Park is asking that the Wheel remain in Golden Gate Park for four more years, to promote the Park and provide commercial benefits.

This ignores the fact that during COVID, the people of San Francisco have crowded into Golden Gate Park by the thousands and celebrated it as a landscape park, finding relief and inspiration in its lawns, meadows, forests, and lakes. The true celebration of the 150th Anniversary of Golden Gate Park has become the rediscovery of our beautiful, peaceful park as a landscape park by the people of San Francisco.

Rec and Park has asked that the Wheel remain to promote business interests and fund RPD programs. This is a slippery slope not only for Golden Gate Park but also for all of our Parks. We believe that our parks should benefit the people of San Francisco as open space, available to everyone on an equal and free basis. They are not piggy-banks, to be used to benefit a City department or commercial interests.

In case there is any doubt as to whether or not a Ferris Wheel belongs in the Music Concourse, it is good to remember that the Winter Exposition lasted a total of 6 months and that the past Ferris wheel was just one small part of that exposition. Temporary food trucks have remained in the park longer, but they are not considered historic or vital to the park, so why should we extend the welcome to a Ferris wheel?

Please deny the request for a four-year extension. The maximum that the Wheel should be allowed to remain in Golden Gate Park is one more year – until June 2022. After that, the Wheel should be permanently removed from the Music Concourse and Golden Gate Park.

Dear Historic Preservation Commissioners and San Francisco Supervisors,

I am writing in opposition to the ferris wheel extension in Golden Gate Park.

I am concerned about the environmental impact of the ferris wheel. I love visiting Golden Gate Park and visit almost every weekend. I have a lot of fun walking and biking through the park during the day and at night (especially during street closures).

However, I also love birdwatching and observing urban wildlife in Golden Gate Parkit's a highlight that I love sharing with my family and with guests from out of town. They are often surprised to see wildlife in San Francisco, and it's a great teaching moment to share my love of nature and conservation. However, bright lights at night and the noise of the diesel generator disrupt the behavior of wildlife (especially migratory and nesting birds). Further, the air quality from the diesel generator negatively impacts animal and human inhabitants alike.

I understand that the commission is concerned about the economic impact of the Ferris wheel--however, I believe that we should not put the environment at the expense of one company's contract.

Concerting park visitation, I would be surprised that the Ferris wheel or concessionaires attract much new or additional visitation. If you visit the Music Concourse on any given weekend, you will see the park crowded with people enjoying the street closures and the nature in the city. I strongly believe that the street closure has done much more in increasing park visitation than the Ferris wheel when it was operating.

One more year – with no further extensions – is the maximum that the wheel should remain in the park. In addition, the generator and all the lights must shut off at sunset to protect our wildlife.

Please remove the wheel permanently from the Music Concourse and Golden Gate Park.

Golden Gate Park is one my favorite places in San Francisco. It's the place where I saw my very first Townsend warbler over 20 years ago. It's also where I encountered my first yellow tiger swallowtail butterfly and the first place I went to seek solace after my mother died on April 7, 2020.

For me, it truly is the urban pastoral retreat that William Hammond Hall and John McLaren strived to build. That's why a diesel-gulping Ferris wheel looks and feels so out of place. But the reason I'm opposed to this carnival attraction goes beyond its flashy appearance or San Francisco Climate Action Plan violations. It's because Recreation and Park didn't even consider the impact on insects or migrating bats and birds, even though they'3re supposed to uphold San Francisco's biodiversity policy. Nor did they consider how strobe lights affect nesting birds like the great horned owls and great blue herons that nest nearby at Strawberry Hill and Stow Lake, respectively. Were you aware that there is a strobe light on the market that bills itself as the most effective deterrent for keeping owls away? I would imagine a 150-foot strobe light would be even more effective.

Please, reject the four-year extension of the Observation Wheel contract. If your intention is to help San Francisco Parks Alliance and SkyStar make some money, please limit the contract to one year, require a switch from diesel to electric and insist on a lights-out after sunset provision.

Dear Commissioners,

Thank you for taking additional time to consider the request to extend the Observation Wheel. I hope that you've been able to engage in some productive dialogue with the Supervisors and other parties about the proposed extension.

As a resident that lives nearby, I want to update you on the current situation. The noise problem has largely been resolved by bringing in a small, portable generator to power the computer systems at night instead of running the 85-decibel diesel generator continuously. Also, the lights on the Wheel have been turned off for the last week. The security guard now parks his car with the headlights shining on the Wheel. These are noticeable improvements that should be carried forward as a condition of any extension.

Given these improvements and provided that they continue henceforth, I support the proposal to compromise and extend the Wheel for a shorter time period – up to June 2022 – with that date being the permanent end date. If the Wheel remains in the Concourse for four more years, I fear it will become a permanent feature there.

I urge officials to get the Wheel connected to the grid as soon as possible to eliminate noise and air pollution from the diesel generator. As both the De Young Museum and Academy of Science will benefit from electrical upgrades, this action should not be contingent on the length of time the Wheel will operate.

Please ensure that the CofA includes new stipulations that address noise associated with the diesel generator in the interim period before the Wheel is connected to the grid. For example, the diesel generator – if in use – should be turned off at night and not started up until 2 hours before the Wheel carries passengers.

Please ensure that the CofA addresses lighting by including additional stipulations that lights on the Wheel be turned off at dusk and throughout the night to protect birds, bats, and insects.

All efforts should be made to keep the park as dark and quiet as possible. Turning off the bright lights in the Music Concourse and on top of the Bandshell at night time while the park is closed would be of great value too.

The Music Concourse is such a beautiful, peaceful, and historical place. Please ensure that it is preserved as such, Commissioners.

Beginning Wednesday, March 3, San Francisco will open up activities such as indoor dining, indoor fitness, and indoor museums and aquariums in accordance with State and with additional local limits

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed and Director of Health Dr. Grant Colfax today announced that San Francisco will resume most businesses and activities that are allowed by the State, following the City's assignment by the State to the Red Tier based on COVID-19 case and hospitalization rates. With some exceptions, San Francisco's reopening will align with what is permitted by the State. New and expanded businesses and activities can reopen starting Wednesday, March 3 at 8:00am, as long as they comply with required safety protocols.

As of today, March 2, San Francisco has met the criteria based on its COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and other health metrics, to advance to the less restrictive red tier on the State's <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u>. This action allows San Francisco to reopen and expand some indoor activities such as dining, museums, movie theaters, and fitness on a limited basis. It also reopens additional outdoor recreation options such as Ferris wheels, carousels and amusement park style train rides; increases the types of outdoor sports that both adults and youth may pursue; and expands outdoor out of school time programs to groups of 25 children. At this time, indoor retail will generally remain capped at 25% capacity and small indoor gatherings with other households are restricted.

"Thanks to everyone in our City acting responsibly and doing their part, we can take another step towards reopening and beginning our recovery," said Mayor Breed. "This year has been incredibly hard on our residents and small businesses, so every step forward is critical to making sure they can survive this pandemic. To make sure we can keep moving forward, we all need to stay focused and continue to follow the health guidance. We are making good progress managing the virus and ramping up vaccinations, and I'm hopeful for what lies ahead. We have shown that San Francisco can do what needs to be done to protect our city and each other."

With some exceptions, San Francisco is reopening in alignment with the activities allowed by the State. Additionally, the City is opening remaining activities allowed in the purple tier that had not yet reopened, such as personal services that require mask removal, and groups of up to six people from three households eating together outdoors. Additionally, San Francisco will lift its local nighttime hours limit for all activities except indoor dining, meaning that non-essential businesses and gatherings, such as outdoor dining, can continue past 10:00pm.

With the move into the red tier, middle schools and high schools that had not yet opened can resume opening with a COVID-19 safety plan approved by the San Francisco Health Officer. All other schools can already be open with an approved safety plan. As they have been able to do since September, all schools may provide in-person instruction and services to youth with disabilities, foster children, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, and children from families experiencing housing or food insecurity among others, without Health Officer approval.

Based on San Francisco's health indicators and its health equity metric, San Francisco meets the State's criteria for advancing to the Red Tier. San Francisco's new COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations have decreased steadily since the holiday surge that peaked in early January. At this time, San Francisco is averaging 67 new cases a day, which is comparable to where the City was in mid-November before the surge.

Although San Francisco's new cases and hospitalization have been trending in a positive direction, the presence of the U.K. (B.1.1.7), West Coast (CAL.20c) and the South African (B.1.351) variants in the Bay Area represent a potential increased risk of contagiousness and greater community spread. Continued adherence to public health prevention measures such as wearing masks, washing hands and physical distancing can limit the impact of variants, particularly as indoor activities begin to open.

Further supporting San Francisco's reopening is the City's ongoing vaccination efforts. At this time, more than 20% of San Francisco's population has received the first dose of vaccine, as have almost 65% of the City's residents over 65. Last week, the City moved to Phase 1B of the State's vaccine prioritization plan, allowing workers in emergency services, education and childcare, and food and agriculture related occupations to begin making appointments to receive vaccinations. COVID-19 vaccine supply remains limited, but with significant steps towards vaccinating the most at risk and the most vulnerable to exposure underway, San Francisco hopes to continue the momentum towards reducing the threat of the virus.

"I am so proud of San Francisco. Nearly a year after our shelter in place order, thanks to our collective actions and commitment to following the health guidelines, we have come through our worst surge since the beginning of the pandemic," stated Dr. Grant Colfax. "We know

how to slow the spread and save lives. As we continue to gradually reopen we need to be aware of the risks and to stay vigilant, especially while vaccines remain limited and the growing presence of more contagious variants pose an increased risk of greater community spread. We encourage everyone to take the opportunity to get vaccinated when and wherever it is offered. Until it's your turn, practice physical distancing, avoid indoor gatherings with people outside your household and wear your mask over your nose and mouth. Together, we can continue to move forward safely."

San Francisco continues to approach reopening with a lens of balancing the public health harms of COVID-19 transmission with the public health harms of economic stress and isolation. San Francisco is updating its health order to come into near alignment with the State, although there remain some areas of departure where it is important to minimize the risk to public health. Although San Francisco is reopening some of the indoor activities allowed in the red tier, indoor activities, particularly those that require mask removal remain significantly more risky than outdoor activities. Because of this, concessions in indoor theaters remain closed at this time. Similarly, although indoor dining is opening, it is limited to members of one household and up to four people per table and indoor service must stop by 10:00pm.

People at risk for severe illness with COVID-19, such as unvaccinated older adults and individuals with health risks, and members of their household are urged to defer participating at this time in activities with other people outside their household where taking protective measures of wearing face masks and social distancing may be difficult, especially indoors or in crowded spaces.

"We are encouraged by the partnership and participation in risk mitigating behavior that San Francisco businesses and patrons have demonstrated, which is what allows the City to take this next necessary step forward. Despite certain unknowns, we are doing this based on the need to sustain our businesses and workers," said Anne Taupier, Acting Director of the Office of Economic and Workforce Development "After a year of restricted interactions and depressed business operations and the consequences those have wrought, we must try to move forward. We can support our local businesses *and* practice preventative health behaviors. We know how to minimize the spread of this virus without requiring our businesses to close and it is up to all of us to do so."

As of today, the San Francisco Department of Public Health will issue <u>final health and safety guidelines</u> to reopen activities allowed under the red tier of the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy, effective as of 8:00am Wednesday, March 3, 2021. The City will post the revised Health Order with detailed requirements to its <u>webpage</u> by the end of the day today March 2, 2021. Under the new Health Order, the following activities will be opened or expanded.

Activities to Resume Wednesday, March 3, 2021

The following activities may be reopened:

- Indoor dining and food courts
 - Indoor dining at restaurants, bars serving meals, cafes and coffee shops, hotels, museums, and food courts in shopping malls may open at up to the lesser of 25% maximum occupancy or 100 people.
 - San Francisco will limit indoor dining tables to members of one household up to a maximum of four people and require indoor service to end by 10:00pm.
- Indoor and outdoor personal services

- Personal services that require mask removal can take place outdoors and the service provider wears an N95 or other well-fitted mask.
- Personal services that require mask removal can occur indoors if the service is provided at least 6 feet away from others and preferably in a separate room and the service provider wears an N95 or other well-fitted mask.

• Indoor fitness

- Gyms and climbing walls may reopen indoors at up to 10% capacity.
- Gentle indoor fitness classes such as stretching, yoga and meditation may operate within indoor fitness guidelines.
- Indoor locker rooms and showers remain closed at this time. Indoor saunas, steam rooms and hot tubs remain closed per State rules.

• Indoor museums, zoos, and aquariums

• Indoor museums, zoos and aquariums can open at up to 25% capacity with an approved safety plan.

• Indoor funerals

- Funerals may take place indoors up to up to 25% capacity.
- Simultaneous indoor and outdoor services may not take place.

• Indoor political demonstrations

• Political demonstrations may take place indoors up to 25% of maximum capacity.

• Schools

• Middle schools and high schools that had not yet reopened may resume reopening for in-person instruction with a COVID-19 Safety Plan approved by the Health Officer. Elementary schools may continue to reopen, as has been the case.

• Outdoor stand-alone amusement rides

 Outdoor stand-alone amusement rides like Ferris wheels, carousels, and train rides will open. Only one household can inhabit each separate space, such as a Ferris wheel cabin or train car.

• Indoor movie theaters

- Indoor movie theaters may open at up to the lesser of 25% or 100 people capacity, but without food or beverage concessions.
- If there are multiple auditoriums, each auditorium is limited to the lesser of 25% or 100 people provided the complex as a whole does not exceed 25% capacity.

• Indoor pools

- Indoor swimming pools may open up to 25% capacity but only for basic swimming and drowning-prevention classes for children.
- Outdoor pools remain open for broader uses.

The following activities may expand their operating capacity:

• Outdoor gatherings

- Small outdoor gatherings of up to 12 people from three households can continue
- Outdoor gatherings that involve food and drink may expand to up to six people from three households.

• Outdoor dining

- Outdoor dining will expand from members of two households up to six people, to members of three households up to six people per table, and will remove the requirement that service end by 10:00 pm.
- Additionally, for those businesses that had constructed barriers between tables in lieu of distancing before December 6, those barriers can remain. New barriers intended to replace the required 6 feet of distancing may not be constructed.

Hotels and other lodging facilities

- Hotels and lodging facilities can open dining and fitness facilities in accordance with guidelines.
- Though San Francisco's travel quarantine for travelers from outside the Bay Area has lifted, the State's travel advisory requiring that non-essential travelers from out of state or beyond 120 miles quarantine for 10 days remains.

• Drive-in venues

- Live entertainment with up to six performers can open in a drive in context of up to 100 cars, with one household per car.
- In-person ordering or pick up of concessions may open if in a designated area with customer metering and eating or drinking in vehicles only.

• Real estate

- Real estate showings must occur virtually or, if a virtual viewing is not feasible, by appointment without limits to the number of people viewing or showing the property.
- Open houses are not permitted at this time.

• Outdoor youth programs and out of school time programs

- Out of school time programs for school-aged children and youth such as Community Hubs, youth sports, and afterschool programs, may increase outdoor cohorts to 25 children or youth.
- Youth may only participate in one program at a time.

• Higher education and adult education

- In-person classes at institutes of higher education, vocational education and adult education can take place outdoors up to 25 students.
- If specialized equipment is required, classes can take place indoors at 25% capacity or if for a core essential service, without a capacity limit as long as 6 foot physical distancing can be maintained.
- No indoor lecture classes may take place.

• Outdoor recreation

- Doubles tennis and doubles pickleball can resume with members of up to four households.
- Up to 12 people from three households may pursue outdoor low, moderate, or high contact sports.
- If part of a supervised youth or adult league or club, outdoor moderate and high
 contact sports such as softball, field hockey, and gymnastics, as well as football,
 basketball, and soccer may resume for stable groups of up to 25 per team,
 following DPH safety precautions.
- Competitions may only occur in county or with teams from adjacent counties (i.e., Marin, San Mateo, and Alameda) in an equal or less restrictive tier. Consistent with State guidelines, travel for out of state tournaments may not take place.

San Francisco's reopening updates will be available online tomorrow, March 3 at SF.gov/reopening.

Public health officials will regularly assess the Key Public Health Indicators, particularly new positive case counts and hospitalizations, to ensure San Francisco has the necessary resources available for those who contract COVID-19. Particularly in light of the variants within the community, public health officials may implement a phased or lagged approach to reopening subsequent tiers in order to ensure enough time to understand how health indicators have responded to the reopening of activities in the current tier and ensure that San Francisco

continues to manage its risk and to protect public health. While San Francisco recognizes and is attempting to align with the State's framework, the City will continue on a reopening path based on its local health indicators and the unique challenges and successes of its local reopening.

The Yerba Buena Chapter of the California Native Plant Society is pleased to submit the following comments as input into the Observation Wheel time extension.

We are a non-profit organization with over 600 members in San Francisco and Northern San Mateo County, and over 10,000 statewide. Our vision includes a future where Californians can experience thriving biological diversity, even in human-altered landscapes.

We're **opposed** to extending the Observation Wheel to four years due to the impact it may have on Golden Gate Park's biodiversity.

The United Nations' Global Assessment Report on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services has found a 45 percent decline in insect populations – insects that rely on our native plants for food – in just in the past 40 years. Lighting pollution has been cited as a major contributor to the decline of insect populations. Insects are most attracted to blue and white light, though shades of orange, yellow and red also draw them in^[1]. The Wheel operates in a broad spectrum of colors late into the night flashing many of these colors.

Half of all insect species are nocturnal^[2]. It has long been known that artificial night lighting affects wildlife through attraction and disorientation^[3], and recent research has documented the extent of the adverse consequences of artificial night lighting to include, for example, plant phenology^[4], predator-prey relations^[5], circadian rhythms^[6] and nocturnal rest and recovery^[7]. Importantly, light attraction and disorientation results in direct mortality of many groups of insects^[8], birds^[9], including seabirds^[10], contributing to species decline^[11].

Insects form the basis of food webs that feed everything from fish on up to grizzly bears. Birds, in particular, depend on them. According to University of Delaware entomologist <u>Doug Tallamy</u>, 96 percent of terrestrial birds rear their young on insects, even species that can survive on seeds and berries other times of the year.

When you decide on the fate of the Wheel we ask that you let science guide

your decision.

Our parks should be a place where biodiversity flourishes, not perishes. Please don't extend the Wheel's insect-killing capacity to four years. A one year extension is acceptable, as long as the lights are out at sunset and the diesel generator is removed.

I am a resident of the Richmond District in San Francisco and enjoy the park on a daily basis, walking, birding, visiting museums and gardens. I'm a naturalist at heart and a member of Golden Gate Audubon, but I disagree with the group's position on the ferris wheel. Golden Gate Park is not a pristine wilderness and there is more noise and light coming from other parts of the city than this ferris wheel creates. Since it has been in place over the last year I have continued to observe birds and wildlife of all kinds carry on without regard for the noise from the generator. My observation is that street traffic noise from Fulton, Lincoln, and Crossover Drive permeate more of the park than the ferris wheel's generator. I do know that light pollution is a serious problem for birds, particularly during migration, but I don't see that this ferris wheel adds much to our local nightscape. I think events like the Outside Lands concerts do far more damage to the parks ecosystem and wildlife than this ferris wheel does. Given that the wheel has been up for a year, and much of the time the generator was running even when it wasn't being operated, I'm fairly certain the local wildlife has adjusted to its presence by now. Therefore taking it down right away really serves no purpose.

I hope that a compromise can be reached with the operators of the Skystar so that they can stay long enough to avoid the financial losses they've incurred due to this extended shutdown.

Golden Gate Park is one my favorite places in San Francisco. It's the place where I saw my very first Townsend warbler over 20 years ago. It's also where I encountered my first yellow tiger swallowtail butterfly and the first place I went to seek solace after my mother died on April 7, 2020.

For me, it truly is the urban pastoral retreat that William Hammond Hall and John McLaren strived to build. That's why a diesel-gulping Ferris wheel looks and feels so out of place. But the reason I'm opposed to this carnival attraction goes beyond its flashy appearance or San Francisco Climate Action Plan violations. It's because Recreation and Park didn't even consider the impact on insects or migrating bats and birds, even though they'3re supposed to uphold San Francisco's biodiversity policy. Nor did they consider how strobe lights affect nesting birds like the great horned owls and great blue herons that nest nearby at Strawberry Hill and Stow Lake, respectively. Were you aware that there is a strobe light on the market that bills itself as the most effective deterrent for keeping owls away? I would imagine a 150-foot strobe light would be even more effective.

Please, reject the four-year extension of the Observation Wheel contract. If your intention is to help San Francisco Parks Alliance and SkyStar make some money, please limit the contract to one year, require a switch from diesel to electric and insist on a lights-out after sunset provision.

Bay Area Cities Want to End Single-Family Home Zoning, But Will It Create More Housing?

The national movement to eliminate exclusionary single-family zoning is picking up steam in the Bay Area as cities explore the benefits of getting rid of a land use policy designed to keep people of color and working class families out of certain neighborhoods.

Last week, the city councils in Berkeley and South San Francisco took steps to end single-family zoning, with Berkeley promising to get rid of it within a year and South City initiating a study as part of its general plan update. After the Berkeley vote, Council Member Terry Taplin, one of the authors of the resolution, called it a "historical moment for us in Berkeley."

But while the movement to allow multifamily buildings in zones previously limited to single-family homes is being embraced as a correction of past discriminatory policies — Sacramento, Oregon and Minneapolis have passed such laws — the question of whether it will actually increase housing production is a lot more complicated, according to builders and architects.

In particular, building "fourplexes" — the four-unit building type that has been promoted as a more democratic, sustainable and affordable alternative to the single-family homes — is challenging in fully built out urban centers such as San Francisco, Oakland and Berkeley, where vacant land is scarce and expensive, construction costs high and lots are small.

In San Francisco, Supervisor Rafael Mandelman has proposed looking at allowing fourplexes in single-family zoned neighborhoods on corner lots and near transit stations. But builders say the city is home to a combination of factors that make fourplexes a tricky proposition. San Francisco has the third smallest lot sizes in the United States — averaging 2,700 square feet — which doesn't allow much room to shoehorn four units. And vacant lots are rare, as are "tear downs," small and outdated homes that don't have much value.

Sean Kieghran, president of San Francisco's Residential Builders Association, said he supports getting rid of single-family only zoning but doesn't think it will result in many new units. Kieghran said that building fourplexes requires either two staircases or a staircase and an elevator, which takes up too much of the site.

And, unless the city streamlined the process of building a fourplex on a single-family lot, builders would run into too many bureaucratic obstacles, Kieghran said. "With how long it takes to get through planning and fire and DPW and all the other red tape it's not likely we are going to see anybody building fourplexes anytime soon," he said.

Opinion by Jay Barmann: San Francisco Needs to Follow Berkeley's Lead and Get Rid of Single-Family Zoning

The largely racist legacy of single-family zoning took a blow this week when Berkeley's city council voted unanimously to make moves to change its general plan and eradicate such zoning — a little over 100 years after the city became the first in the country to establish a single-family-zoned neighborhood reserved for whites.

For Berkeley, this is a necessary step to undo one of the last vestiges of racist planning practices — which were once more explicitly designed with segregation as a goal, with racially restrictive covenants and so-called "red-lined" maps. But single-family zoning was something Berkeley pioneered in the Elmwood neighborhood in 1916, and the effects are still being felt today, city councilmembers said, as the city's Black population has continued to be pushed out.

"It's certainly not going to happen overnight, and I don't think I've indicated otherwise," said Councilmember Lori Droste at Tuesday night's council meeting, per Berkeleyside. "But [the resolution] is symbolic in stating that we want to address systemic racism. We can't address racial and economic segregation unless we address zoning reform, that's definitely true."

The council expects to complete the lengthy and complicated general plan change process in two years — and similar changes that up-zone neighborhoods for greater density and more affordability are taking place across Oregon and in the city of Sacramento. A task force in San Jose has also recommended studying the idea, but a statewide bill that would have made building duplexes and multi-unit buildings on single-family lots much easier failed in the state Senate last year.

Housing advocates have long said that such zoning changes are no quick fix toward housing affordability, without broader efforts to protect renters and support mixed-income housing.

In housing-starved San Francisco, we are decades late in facing the fact that we live in a city that was developed half as a suburb. As the map below illustrates, from an October 2020 study by UC Berkeley's Othering and Belonging Institute, much of San Francisco's western and southern quadrants are dominated by single-family neighborhoods — some of which are well served by mass transit and some of which are not. While there isn't much room left in the city for the kinds of mega-developments like the one still in the works in Parkmerced, there is a ton of opportunity to allow more multi-unit buildings in ersatz-suburban neighborhoods like the Sunset, West Portal, and Glen Park.

South San Francisco May Upzone Single-Family Neighborhoods

With an unprecedented decision, South San Francisco is the first city in San Mateo County to explore ending single-family zoning.

The South San Francisco City Council narrowly agreed with a 3-2 vote to look into allowing construction of duplexes, triplexes and other moderately dense development in neighborhoods traditionally reserved solely for single-family homes.

The decision Wednesday, Feb. 24, puts South City on the path of other communities such as Berkeley and San Jose where officials may terminate exclusionary zoning policies in hopes of addressing affordability and equity concerns.

"If we are able to provide more affordable housing and also look at modern housing for the

missing middle, I think we need to explore all options," said Vice Mayor Mark Nagales, who supported the proposal with his colleagues James Coleman and Eddie Flores. Mayor Mark Addiego and Councilwoman Flor Nicolas voted against the proposal.

Under the decision, officials will consider amending residential zoning codes through the forthcoming general plan update. The proposal will be brought to an advisory committee formed to guide the update, and community outreach will be sought before any formal policy amendments are considered by councilmembers.

Consultants hired to facilitate the general plan update anticipated discussions around the issue will cost about \$100,000 and delay the process by about four months.

The Upzoning Wave Finally Catches Up to California

It was a small step, with huge symbolic significance: On Tuesday night, the city council of Berkeley, California, unanimously approved a resolution calling for the end of exclusionary zoning by 2022, kicking off a lengthy process to reform the city's general plan with the aim to eliminate widespread bans on apartments and multi-unit residences.

The goal is to reduce housing costs as well as to address the racist roots of laws that restrict development to single-family homes, said Lori Droste, the city council member who authored the resolution, which is a statement of intent, not a policy change. "It would have been really surprising if people voted against an attempt to end a vestige of past discrimination," she said, pointing to the history of redlining and racially exclusionary covenants that underpin zoning codes to this day.

Berkeley plays a prominent role in that history: Its Elmwood neighborhood was among the first parts of the U.S. to enact a single-family zoning code in 1916, according to the resolution. Today, such codes cover some 82% of residential land in the Bay Area, according to UC Berkeley's Othering and Belonging Institute, and 49% in Berkeley.

The resolution comes amid a flurry of similar actions by other cities in Northern California. Last month, the Sacramento city council passed a unanimous decision to allow up to four units on virtually every residential lot. A San Jose task force voted last summer for the city to consider a similar upzoning, and South San Francisco's city council approved a plan to study the same type of change earlier this week.

That's particularly true in Berkeley. The ultra-liberal home to the University of California's crown jewel campus was the subject of a 2018 New York Times article that highlighted how entrenched support for single detached units in some of the country's costliest neighborhoods make failing proposals for duplexes, triplexes, and other "missing middle" housing a foregone conclusion. David Garcia, the policy director at UC Berkeley's Terner Center, called these cities' steps towards legalizing modest increases in density "important."

"The amount of land dedicated to single-family zoning in pretty much every city is overwhelming," he said. "We have artificially constrained what we can build, so by allowing up to four units, you've created a lot of new places where housing can be built."

Local governments across the U.S. have recently turned to upzoning to tackle acute housing shortages, bucking America's 20th-century template for picket-fence neighborhoods in favor of greater density. Minneapolis made history in 2018 with its citywide upzoning plan that sought to redress a history of racial covenants and redlining: "More cities are taking on the racist history of zoning & the narrative has shifted," tweeted Lisa Bender, the Minneapolis city

council president who spearheaded that plan, in reaction to Berkeley's news. In 2019, Oregon passed a state law ending exclusionary zoning in most cities, and Portland went further the following year. Seattle recently upzoned 27 neighborhoods, and Charlotte and Philadelphia have explored similar ideas.

Upzoning has been a harder sell in California, but a confluence of factors is spurring change, observers say. One is the persistent effort by state legislators to override local laws that impede new housing, in particular State Senator Scott Wiener's SB 50, a proposal to eliminate exclusionary zoning codes in transit- and job-rich single-family home neighborhoods. Though SB 50 failed to become law in 2020, it and its predecessor, SB 827, drew national attention and energized housing leaders and activists across the state as housing shortages and homelessness worsened.

Florida Street Parking Lot Will Become 168 Units of Housing

The San Francisco Planning Commission approved a 168-unit residential building Thursday that will go up on an existing parking lot.

The proposed project at 321 Florida St. near 16th Street, is a nine-story building sponsored by DM Development and Urban Land Development, with Urban Land Capital as the capital partner.

The project would include 64 studios, 37 one-bedroom units, 67 two-bedroom units and an approximately 1,500-square-foot retail space on the ground floor that will be given, free of cost, to Community Arts Stabilization Trust, a San Francisco-based nonprofit that acquires land for use by artists or art organizations.

Of the 168 units in the building, 23 (13.6 percent) will be below market rate, 14 of which are intended for residents making between 50 and 55 percent of the area median income. In 2020, 55 percent of area median income was \$56,400 for a family of two and \$70,450 for a family of four.

Project sponsors will pay an approximately \$3.8 million density bonus affordable housing fee. California's State Density Bonus Program allows builders to exceed height limits in exchange for more affordable housing, and city legislation places a fee on developments that take the optional bonus

"In addition, we have signed a [memorandum of agreement] with United to Save the Mission to make a contribution of \$2 million dollars for the acquisition of 2675 Folsom St. to develop up to 125 units of 100 percent affordable housing," Mark Macdonald, the CEO of DM Development.

Mission Housing Development Corporation will reportedly be responsible for the development on Folsom Street.

High-ish Rise in the Excelsior Slated for Approval

As we first revealed back in 2019, plans for a seven-story infill building to rise up to 74 feet and six inches in height upon the shuttered Club Tapatio site at 4742 Mission Street were in the works and Planning was encouraging the project team to add another floor to the Excelsior District development as envisioned.

But as we outlined at the time, buildings with occupied floors that are 75 feet or higher are required to meet more stringent, and costly, high-rise building code requirements.

And with that in mind, while an eighth floor has been added to the building, and the density of the

proposed development has been increased to yield 46 dwelling units, versus 36 as originally proposed, the height of the proposed building remains at 74-feet and six inches, as newly rendered below.

SF Restaurant Owner Fears Closure Over Neighbor's Complaint

It's been a lifeline for struggling restaurants throughout San Francisco. Outdoor dining parklets have allowed these businesses to take their customers outside as indoor dining remains off limits.

But now one restaurant in Lower Pac Heights is at risk of shutting down because neighbors want their parklet to close.

The owner of the building says Harry Bar which is next door is preventing them from selling this closed down space because the parklet blocks it.

The city has informed the owners of the bar they have to remove it within the next few weeks, but Harry's is concerned without an extension to keep this space open they may be forced to close their business down

A big chunk of this outdoor dining parklet in front of Harry's Bar on Fillmore Street is at risk of being removed

The bar has invested \$30,000 in putting this up and it has helped them to stay in business.

But now this portion may have to go.

"We're kind of walking a little bit of a tightrope right now financially," Charles Johnson said.

Harry's general manager Charles Johnson says they opened up this space last summer.

The former business owner in the building next door was apparently fine with it.

But that business owner may have given this spot away without the proper consent.

The building's owner is now demanding the parklet be removed after the store front failed because of the pandemic.

Please -- no more than a 1 year CofA extension for the Observation Wheel

Historic Preservation Commissioners:

Extending the Certificate of Appropriateness for the observation wheel in the Music

Concourse in Golden Gate Park for 4 more years would be wrong for so many reasons.

The original project -- installing and operating the wheel for one year as part of an event -- should never have been given a categorical exemption. The OPERATION of the wheel, not just its installation, should have been subject to proper environmental review. Extending the project for 4 more years without remedying this error would only compound it. Many thanks to those who questioned the cat. ex. declaration. (For more, see 1 below.)

There is also the risk of setting a very bad historic review precedent. When checking whether the project meets the Secretary of the Interior's Standards, staff stated that if the wheel were permanent, it would NOT be an appropriate addition to the historic design of the landmarked Music Concourse -- before saying but since the wheel is temporary, it's OK. If "Temporary" can mean "1 year, for a specific event" but also mean "5 years even though the event has ended", what else can "temporary" mean?

About the claim that the wheel will be important for economic recovery: this is now supported by a statement that park vendors report an uptick in business during the time when the wheel was allowed to operate last fall. But what evidence is there that the reported uptick came from wheel riders, rather than from visitors to all the other attractions that had also opened in or near the Music Concourse -- especially considering that the wheel operator sells drinks and snacks? Correlation is not causation.

About the idea that anyone opposed to the wheel's presence in the Music Concourse must be opposed to "joy" and "fun": it's the LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION of the wheel that is the problem. Besides, there is plenty of "joy" and "fun" to be had in our park from enjoying nature, appreciating art, exploring science, and engaging in exercise and play.

The wheel, which should never have been installed in the Music Concourse, should be gone, as originally scheduled, by the end of this month.

But if the choice <u>must</u> be made between a 4 year extension as proposed by RPD and a compromise 1 year ONLY extension proposed by Supervisors, I urge you to vote for the latter, with conditions about lighting, noise, and power sources.

Please help protect the nature in, as well as the nature of, the historic landscape that is part of our park.

And thank you for taking your job seriously.

I am opposed to the Wheel staying in Golden Gate Park, because the mechanical noise and bright lights disrupt the silence and darkness of the nighttime in the park – which is a part

of what was intended to be preserved in the park when it was built. The noise and lights have incredibly negative impacts on the wildlife in the area (i.e., all species rely on darkness and silence to survive - including humans).

One more year – with no further extensions – is the maximum that the Wheel should remain in the park. In addition, the generator and all the lights must shut off at sunset. Please remove this Wheel permanently from the Music Concourse and Golden Gate Park.

Furthermore, I have been told by a friend that "the historic vision for GG Park is being undone by making the Music Concourse into a 'downtown'." This is unacceptable. This is antithetical to the original intention of the park. Nighttime aerial photographs of the GG Park show the stark contrast between the bright, densely packed urban area surrounding it with the pitch black, open, undeveloped area that preserves nature. Beautiful treasures such as the Japanese Tea Garden, the Conservatory of Flowers, the area surrounding the Palace of Fine Arts, and the Botanical Garden depend on us to be good stewards and ensure that no light pollution or noise pollution can wreak havoc. I am strongly opposed to the idea of creating a "downtown" in the park or any kind of a thoroughfare that brings more lights or more constructions.

Although I do not live in the city proper, I have enjoyed the beauty of the park and even the various recreational events that it hosts yearly for over 30 years (e.g., music concerts, BBQs, Comedy events, Bike and Beer festival, Hardly Strictly, Outside Lands, and many others.) The park is meant to be enjoyed by people, but we must do so thoughtfully and respectfully for the nature that it is originally intended to protect for all generations (especially those to come in the future).

Dear Commissioners,

I favor immediate removal of the observation wheel or its relocation to a more suitable

city site; but should a compromise be considered as suggested by my supervisor Connie Chan, a proposed removal date of June 22, 2022 seems more than generous considering the following.

A SF Recreation and Parks representative testified at a 1/15/20 hearing before the San Francisco Historic Preservation Committee that the wheel was intended for one year to encourage excitement over the park's 150th anniversary and they had no interest in extending it beyond one year. Now they offer two reasons for a four year extension. One is that it will support the City's economic recovery. The extent to which local businesses may profit is purely speculative. Certainly the restaurants on 9th Avenue are unlikely to reap huge profits since SkyStar Partners operates a concession stand selling food and drink which already competes with local in-Park vendors.

Their second reason is to allow the out-of-state operator to accrue the \$1 million it expected to make. As you know the time of operation stipulated in the Conditions of Approval was just 10 months starting April 4, 2020 and that the project site was to be fully restored to existing conditions by the end of March 2021. Considering the fact that a full environmental impact assessment of this project was never done, a four year extension is excessive and potentially damaging to park habitat, which should be of greater concern than the profits of an out-of-state vendor.

Finally it is disturbing that the SF Parks Alliance is the recipient of the "City's share" of the Observation Wheel given that it is now being investigated as part of a larger FBI citywide corruption scandal.

I respectfully request that should you decide that a compromise date be appropriate please require that the Wheel be completely removed by June 22, 2022.

Dear Commissioner:

I am writing in opposition to the Ferris wheel that has been placed in the Music Concourse in Golden Gate Park. It is wrong in so many ways.

The RPC already voted to approve a four year extension although your commission has not even voted on it. They allow for no disagreement with their activities, no checks and balances. Please stand up to RPD and the RPC and support the compromise one year limited extension to end this fiasco.

The Ferris wheel is an amusement park fixture that was insensitively placed into the Music Concourse formal landscape, between the de Young Museum and the Academy of Sciences. Extra lighting was also added to the Temple of Music, magnifying the amusement park feel of it. I understand that you approved it under the pressure of the 150th celebration, and thinking that it was to be there for only one year.

For me, the Music Concourse has been a place where I would sit for a while after going to the de Young Museum, or to the Academy, to absorb what I had seen. Or, I might meet a friend there. The Music Concourse feels like the heart of Golden Gate Park to me.

From a purely economic standpoint for SF, RPD crafted a bad business deal. We keep voting for bond money for RPD, but this certainly makes me question doing that. SkyStar LLC, a St Louis based business, would have grossed about 7 million dollars if there had been 500,000 riders over the original one year agreement. The "non-profit arm" of RPD would have earned around \$400,000. Additionally, the St Louis Corporation gets to sell food and drink and merchandise, while claiming that the wheel is benefiting local businesses. The Ferris wheel is a used "portable" one that was in Cincinnati, Ohio, before SkyStar moved it to San Francisco.

San Francisco residents, by paying their dollars to SkyStar, are only helping the SkyStar LLC investors recover economically, not helping San Francisco itself. SkyStar also received Paycheck Protection Money from the government to maintain their employees. The dollars of San Francisco residents could be going to small businesses locally to help our city recover instead of into SkyStar's pockets. We do not even know who the SkyStar LLC investors are.

From an environmental perspective, the Ferris wheel is a disaster, as has been discussed at length. The bright strobe lighting can be seen from far away and is

damaging to wildlife. Bringing people into the park at night also disrupts animal life. The wheel did not have an environmental impact report. Climate change is here and San Francisco can no longer ignore nature.

I can support a limited one year extension for the wheel, with the lighting going off at dusk. This allows for any riders who still want to ride the wheel to do so, and hopefully settles the conflict. At the end of that extension, the wheel is to be permanently removed.

Dear Commission President Hyland,

D4ward is a forward-thinking advocacy group in District 4. We are opposed to the Observation Wheel in Golden Gate Park; however, in respect of Supervisor Connie Chan's efforts on behalf of Golden Gate Park, we would accept the Wheel staying until June 2022, as long as there are guarantees that it will be removed PERMANENTLY from Golden Gate Park at that time.

We also would like to thank Supervisor Chan for asking for a compromise, and Supervisors Preston and Peskin, as well as Board of Supervisors President Walton, for joining her in supporting our premier park.

We respect science. Climate change is real, and it is caused by thoughtless human activity. We are confused that the Department of Recreation and Park does not understand the impact of artificial light and more structures on park habitat and wildlife. Golden Gate Park is one of the few places in San Francisco where wildlife can find refuge at night. Wildlife needs darkness. Light pollution can have a negative impact on birds – both resident and migrating — as well as bats, insects, amphibians, and other animals.

We also believe that Golden Gate Park provides the opportunity for families and children from all income levels to enjoy nature close to home. Most San Franciscans do not have second homes in the country; many cannot even afford to travel outside of San Francisco to experience and learn about nature. Golden Gate Park gives them that opportunity. But if the Park is filled up with artificial attractions, especially those that threaten wildlife, then we are all the poorer for it.

Online court reservations open today for the philanthropy-funded Lisa & Douglas Goldman Tennis Center, which will open its doors March 3

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed today announced the new Lisa & Douglas Goldman Tennis Center in Golden Gate Park will open on Wednesday, March 3, 2021. The \$27 million renovation has transformed the legendary Golden Gate Park facility into a state-of-the-art public tennis center accessible to first-time players and seasoned athletes alike.

Online court reservations can be made starting today at <u>goldmantenniscenter.com</u> or by calling (415) 581-2540. COVID-19 health precautions require advance reservations to play or visit.

"The Goldman Tennis Center facility honors the incredible history of tennis in Golden Gate Park and provides a place where the next generation of players can learn perseverance, integrity, and fair play," said Mayor Breed. "This year has shown us just how important it is for all of our residents to have access to open space and opportunities for outdoor recreation. This beautifully designed, accessible space will provide a wonderful place for San Franciscans to get outside, get exercise and have fun safely."

The Goldman Tennis Center includes 16 USTA-regulation tennis courts, including a sunken

stadium style court. Lighting on the courts will allow users to enjoy an additional 20,000 hours of play annually. Five mini-courts can be used to teach young children the game or for pickleball. Off the court, the 7,800 square foot Taube Family Clubhouse, designed by architectural firm EHDD (with HGA), features a lounge, recreation room, locker room and kitchen. The ADA-accessible site includes new patio spaces and a garden. "Spin," an outdoor vibrant ceramic tile mural with a kaleidoscopic effect by artist Sanaz Mazinani and engaged through the San Francisco Arts Commission, features images of trailblazers on and off the court: Alice Marble, Arthur Ashe, Billie Jean King and Roger Federer.

The facility also includes a dedicated classroom to expand the Tennis & Learning Center (TLC), an innovative Recreation and Park Department program that provides after school tennis instruction, academic tutoring, and leadership development to youth from underserved San Francisco neighborhoods. TLC, which currently serves elementary school students, will launch its middle school program in the new facility.

Infrastructure projects, like the Tennis Center, create well-paying jobs and will be a critical part of San Francisco's recovery from COVID-19. The Tennis Center capital project, which broke ground in April 17, 2019, created more than 100 construction jobs.

Since 1894, players of every age and ability have learned, played, and competed in Golden Gate Park, including tennis greats Alice Marble, Billie Jean King, Rosie Casals and Peanut Louie Harper.

"The opening of the Goldman Tennis Center adds another dimension to the diverse recreational options in Golden Gate Park," said District 5 Supervisor Dean Preston. "It provides a world class facility for San Franciscans to hone their skills and nurture their friendships."

"For San Francisco's tennis community, youth athletes, and pickleball players, the Goldman Tennis Center realizes a longtime dream," said San Francisco Recreation and Park Department General Manager Phil Ginsburg. "The storied Golden Gate Park courts have been transformed into the best and most inclusive municipal tennis center in the country, embodying the motto 'Love All."

"As the community partner at the Goldman Tennis Center, we are thrilled to connect, energize, and advocate for San Francisco tennis players," said Martha Ehrenfeld, Tennis Coalition of San Francisco Co-Chair. "We are excited to see the tennis center in Golden Gate Park revived as the hub of public tennis in the city, inspiring many future generations of players to learn, compete, and create community around the sport of tennis."

The Goldman Tennis Center will offer affordable rates, including discounts for seniors, youth, and San Francisco residents. Weekday court rentals will be free for San Francisco youth before 6 p.m., while seniors can rent a court starting at \$4 an hour.

Lifetime Activities, which runs municipal tennis centers in Cupertino, Pleasanton, Santa Clara, Sunnyvale and Walnut Creek, will manage day-to-day operations at the Goldman Tennis Center. Throughout its tenure as facility operator, Lifetime will provide all new middle school participants in the TLC program with tennis shoes. HEAD Racquet Sports has donated high performance racquets and tennis balls to the youth players.

"We are excited to offer tennis court rentals, an online and phone-in reservation system,

leagues, socials, tournaments and private or small group learning experiences for the entire San Francisco community," said Dana Gill, CEO of Lifetime Activities. "Players of all ages and interest levels can purchase tennis balls and pickleballs, racquets, paddles and accessories, enjoy healthy snacks and tasty beverages, and try out our racquet stringing and ball machine services."

The Goldman Tennis Center was funded through a public-private partnership with leadership gifts from Taube Philanthropies, the Lisa and Douglas Goldman Fund, the Koret Foundation, Jackie and Joby Pritzker, and the Fisher Family. The San Francisco Parks Alliance served as fiscal sponsor. Approximately \$4.5 million was allocated to this project by the San Francisco Recreation and Park Department from the 2012 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond.

"Lisa and I are thrilled that the dream has become a reality for all tennis players to enjoy. This is a gorgeous, world class facility," said Douglas Goldman, President of the Lisa and Douglas Goldman Fund.

"I have been involved with tennis most of my life and it was natural for me to help with the redevelopment of the Golden Gate Park tennis center. Hi All


I know there is a lot of debate on the Ferris Wheel in Golden Gate park. From my viewpoint, it should definitely stay. A couple bullets:



MAYOR LONDON BREED ANNOUNCES SPENDING PLAN FOR HISTORIC REINVESTMENT IN SAN FRANCISCO'S AFRICAN-AMERICAN COMMUNITY

Following months of community engagement and outreach led by the Human Rights Commission, the City has developed a spending plan to direct \$120 million over the next two years to improve outcomes for Black and African-American youth and their families

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed and Board of Supervisors President Shamann Walton today announced the City's plan for reinvesting \$120 million in San Francisco's African-American community over the next two years, with the creation of a new, citywide initiative: "The Dream Keeper Initiative." This funding follows an extensive community and stakeholder engagement process and is part of Mayor Breed's roadmap for reforming public safety and addressing structural inequities in San Francisco.

The goal of the Dream Keeper Initiative is to improve outcomes for San Francisco's Black and African-American youth and their families, and will provide family-based navigation supports to ensure that the needs of all family members are addressed cohesively and comprehensively. With this coordinated approach, the Dream Keeper Initiative aims to break the cycle of poverty and involvement in the criminal justice system for the families in its City programs and ensure that new investments, including in youth development, economic opportunity, community-led change, arts and culture, workforce, and homeownership, are accessible to San

Francisco's families who are most in need.

"We know that to actually see true, lasting change, we need to focus on helping entire families – from early education for kids, to job training and workforce support for their parents, and serve communities that have been systematically harmed by past policies," said Mayor London Breed. "To make these decisions, we've listened to the African-American community about what's worked, and what hasn't, and we are committed to actually delivering on the promises that are made, but all too often, aren't kept. It's not enough to say that Black Lives Matter. We must listen to Black voices, commit the resources, and create the programs that will actually right past wrongs and get people resources and services so they can build their futures here in San Francisco and know that their City has their back. I want to thank the Human Rights Commission and Director Sheryl Davis, as well as all the community members who have put in the time to put together something that will help people take care of their families, their parents, and live with dignity."

In June 2020, following the killing of George Floyd, Mayor Breed and Supervisor Walton announced a plan to prioritize the redirection of resources from law enforcement to support the African-American community. Following that plan, the San Francisco Human Rights Commission (HRC) led an extensive and collaborative process with the community to identify and prioritize funding needs and developed a report to guide the reinvestment. The community engagement process included more than 60 community meetings, listening sessions, coalition convenings, and surveys with over 700 respondents. As part of the budget process, Mayor Breed redirected \$120 million from law enforcement for investments in the African American community for Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22.

"This initial investment to improve outcomes for the Black community and overturn years of disinvestment and inequitable resource distribution is just the first step in righting the wrongs of history," said President of the Board of Supervisors Shamann Walton. "We now have to continue to prioritize communities that have never had a chance to build true wealth and this is a first step towards true reparations for the Black community here in San Francisco. We are proud of this work and looking forward to doing more."

"I am beyond grateful for the opportunity to design and lead the community engagement process. On the heels of a divisive period in history, we were able to convene people with diverse thoughts, experiences and voices to develop strategies for change," said San Francisco Human Rights Commission Executive Director Sheryl Davis. "Participants in the meetings expressed gratitude to Mayor Breed and President Walton for creating a space that encouraged conversation and creating a plan for resources to improve outcomes, mend broken hearts, heal wounded spirits and begin to fix the systems that caused the damage."

Decades of disinvestment in the African-American community and racially disparate policies in San Francisco have exacerbated disproportionate harm in Black communities, affecting outcomes from health and wellness to housing insecurity and economic outcomes. In San Francisco, the average income for a Black household is \$31,000, as compared with \$110,000 for white families. As many as 19% of African-American children in San Francisco live in poverty. Black and African-American individuals comprise 35% of the City's unhoused population, despite making up only 5% of the population as a whole. This inequality perpetuates the systemic social determinants of health. Black communities in San Francisco have higher rates of diabetes, higher rates of maternal mortality, and are more likely to be hospitalized for heart disease than other races.

The Dream Keeper Initiative, inspired by Langston Hughes's line: "What happens to a dream deferred?" seeks to address and remedy those racially disparate policies and make meaningful investments in San Francisco's Black and African-American community. With \$60 million in funding for FY 2020-21, the City will begin to implement programs and allocate funds through existing programs and new Requests for Proposals.

<u>Dream Keeper Initiative – Investments in San Francisco's Black and African-American Community</u>

The initiative recognizes the diversity of San Francisco's Black community and includes investments in a wide range of programs that will support youth, families, seniors, and members of the Black LGBTQ+ community. The Dream Keeper Initiative aims to refocus the City's approach to youth by focusing on the entire family, and providing the support to navigate and connect to existing community and public programs.

The \$60 million in the Dream Keeper Initiative for Fiscal Year 2020-21 will support the following programs, and the numbers below are approximate. Investments will inform the allocations for the second year of reinvestment funding, as well any ongoing funding in future years.

Youth Development and Education: \$3.6 million for youth development and early education programs to support families and address the academic and social emotional learning needs of youth with a cultural and racial equity lens. Programs funded by this investment will be in the areas of family engagement, academic support, and literacy and early education.

Arts and Culture: \$2.1 million to provide art and culture opportunities for low-income and Black communities, will help Black-led and Black-serving arts organizations build organizational capacity to successfully compete for grant funding, and will direct funding toward Black theater companies, artist mini grants, and artist collaboratives.

Accountability and Systems Change: \$6.6 million to ensure accountability mechanisms and enable Black-led organizations to support and track its various outcomes and impacts. This funding will help African-American and Black-led nonprofit organizations with technical assistance and capacity building so they are better-positioned to work with the City in developing and implementing programs that are part of the Dream Keeper Initiative and other City programs. Funding will also go toward a new program that will connect approximately 400 Black/African-American children and their families with a Family Advocate who will provide case management, connection to services, and long-term investments with the mission to make a lasting impact in each families' lives.

City Employment Pipelines: \$4.8 million to increase diversity in City employment and creating employment pipelines and human resources infrastructure that will support increased representation of Black people in City classifications and roles in which they are currently underrepresented.

Workforce Training and Development: \$6 million to workforce training and development programs for youth and adults, and will support initiatives being led by the Office of Economic and Workforce Development. This includes stipends for people in training programs, providing financial incentives for students pursuing higher education, and funding

arts workforce opportunities.

Guaranteed Income: \$7 million to create a guaranteed income program, which will complement other programs in the Initiative.

Culturally Affirming Spaces: \$2 million to promote culturally affirming spaces, such as investments in commercial corridors in historically African-American neighborhoods, incubation hubs for small businesses and community groups, and funding for African-American cultural events.

Business and Entrepreneur Support: \$3 million to provide support for Black-owned small businesses and entrepreneurs, including Trans-owned businesses, ranging from business development and technical assistance and anti-displacement services to support for new business storefronts and business start-up grants.

Health and Wellbeing: \$14.9 million to promote community health and wellbeing, including through restorative justice programs, food security, and culturally-competent mental health services.

Housing and Homeownership: \$10 million to provide housing support and stabilization and promote homeownership for San Francisco's Black and African-American community.

The above programs and initiatives involve multiple City departments, including the Human Rights Commission, Office of Economic and Workforce Development, Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Health, Department of Human Resources, Office of Early Care and Education, Arts Commission, Department of Child Support Services, HOPE SF, and the Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector.

MAYOR LONDON BREED ANNOUNCES \$500 STIMULUS FOR LOWER-WAGE WORKERS AND FAMILIES

New financial support initiatives offer up to \$500 local tax credit and cash stimulus to households eligible for the San Francisco Working Families Credit

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed and the San Francisco Human Services Agency (SFHSA) today announced \$1.9 million in financial support initiatives that will provide up to \$500 cash assistance this tax filing season to San Francisco working families struggling to make ends meet as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, free tax assistance centers are now open at dozens of San Francisco neighborhood locations to answer questions and help filers get more money back when they apply for local, state, and federal tax credits.

The 2021 San Francisco Working Families Credit (WFC) offers low- and moderate-income households with children a local tax credit of up to \$250 to help cover day-to-day expenses such as utilities, rent, food, and child care. In addition to the opportunity to apply for the WFC this year, 4,000 households who were recipients of the WFC in 2020 will receive an additional rapid cash stimulus payment of \$250.

New this year, the California Earned Income Tax Credit (CalEITC) and the WFC are available to taxpayers filing with an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN), providing expanded assistance to San Francisco's undocumented and mixed-status immigrant

households who pay taxes but who do not have a social security number.

"With the economic hardships so many people are facing due to COVID-19, and with more people likely qualifying for benefits than in years past, these immediate payments are critical right now," said Mayor Breed. "We want to make sure people have the help they need to file, so that it's as easy as possible and we can get financial resources into the hands of people who need it most."

"With unprecedented numbers of families still recovering from a sudden loss of earnings last year, San Francisco's free tax assistance centers are here to help people get back every dollar of tax credits they are eligible to receive," said Trent Rhorer, Executive Director of the San Francisco Human Services Agency. "Our City is unique in offering a Working Families Credit so we can provide additional financial support on top of the state and federal tax credits. Extending this local stimulus to more families provides emergency relief for those struggling to make ends meet at a critical moment in the pandemic economic slowdown."

Working Families Credit - \$250 per family

The WFC offers low- and moderate-income working families with children up to \$250 in cash back. When combined with state and federal tax credits, the WFC can help families receive up to \$9,600 in tax credits. San Francisco created the WFC in 2005 and is one of a few cities in the country to offer a local tax credit.

With more than 300,000 unemployment insurance benefits claims filed in San Francisco since the onset of COVID-19 and the expansion of the CalEITC to filers with an ITIN, new households are anticipated to be eligible for the WFC this year. Expanding the CalEITC and WFC is a vital support for working immigrant households hit hard by the economic slowdown and excluded from financial relief programs like federal stimulus payments and unemployment insurance.

To qualify for the WFC, households must have a 2020 income of no more than \$56,844, claim the federal Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), and submit an application to SFHSA. All eligible families are encouraged to apply. The WFC application is now available to complete online: SFHSA.org/applyWFC

"Given the pandemic's economic toll on low-income Latinos in San Francisco, many community members cannot pay rent or even put food on the table tonight," said MEDA Associate Director of Asset Building Programs Jackie Marcelos. "We are pleased that the City and state are affording ITIN filers the opportunity to receive the CalEITC and Working Families Credit, as our undocumented neighbors have been especially hard hit given that these contributors to our society were left out of federal stimulus programs."

In September 2020, Governor Newsom signed Assembly Bill 1876, expanding access to the CalEITC to ensure all California tax filers, specifically undocumented ITIN filers who are otherwise eligible, may qualify for the CalEITC and the Young Child Tax Credit (YCTC). State officials estimate the expansion of CalEITC to ITIN tax filers will benefit more than 600,000 Californians.

Rapid Cash Stimulus - \$250 per family

The City will provide a supplemental rapid cash payment of \$250 to nearly 4,000 low-income families who already received the WFC in 2020. No application is required for \$250 the rapid

cash stimulus. Households who received the WFC last year will be contacted by SFHSA to verify their address and banking information, followed by automatic payments anticipated to arrive before the end of March.

For many San Franciscans who earned low wages before the pandemic, the COVID-19 economic downturn and job losses are only worsening the economic disparities they experience every day. This stimulus will help provide immediate relief to the unprecedented financial challenges working families continue to face as the state experiences the most intense surge of the virus.

Free Tax Assistance – Online Tools, Drop-off, and Select In-Person Assistance

On average, American <u>taxpayers spend nearly \$200</u> to have a tax professional file their return. San Francisco's free tax assistance centers allow filers to maximize their refunds through tax credits and avoid preparation fees.

Free tax preparation is available to people who cannot afford professional services from a paid tax preparer and to older adults, those with limited English proficiency, and people with disabilities who require assistance. Internal Revenue Service (IRS) certified tax experts prepare tax returns, answer questions, and determine if filers qualify for tax credits such as the EITC and WFC.

San Francisco's free tax assistance is provided by SFHSA through a partnership with the United Way Bay Area, which includes the Mission Economic Development Association and Arriba Juntos, among other local non-profit partners. IRS-certified providers make it easy to safely and securely file taxes using online tools, drop-off, or in-person assistance at select locations.

Filers with a combined household income of \$66,000 or less in 2020 are eligible for free tax assistance services. To have their taxes prepared, residents should present income documents from all jobs worked and unemployment income statements throughout 2020, as well as their social security number or ITIN, bank account numbers, a valid photo ID, and reportable expenses such as child care. In addition to free tax help, SFHSA can connect filers to no-fee bank accounts, credit repair services, and financial education coaching. The deadline to file is April 15, 2021.

The IRS estimates that nearly one out of five eligible people miss out on the EITC because they do not know that they qualify, or do not know where to find free tax filing assistance. Last year, more than 8,000 returns were filed at San Francisco's free tax assistance centers.

Greetings, Department Heads and Assigned Filing Officers –

This e-mail announces the start of the period for filing the Annual <u>Statements of Economic Interests</u> (<u>Form 700</u>). Every elected official and public employee who makes or influences governmental decisions is required to file a Form 700. This year it is due on <u>Thursday, April 1, 2021</u>.

You play an important role in helping to ensure that the provisions of the Political Reform Act ("Act") are effectively and efficiently administered. To achieve this goal, you are required to perform specified duties under the Act pertaining to the collection of disclosure statements. Below are links to resources that will help you through the 2021 annual filing deadline and beyond.

No Extension of April 1, 2021 Deadline

- There is no expected change in the deadline. (Last year was an exception, as the due date coincided with the beginning of the COVID-19 shutdowns.)
- If the filer is not filing electronically, they must submit a their Form 700 statement with a wet-signature. A postmark by 4/1/2021 is sufficient. Please retain the envelope with the statement for the record.





Key Reminders

- There is no provision in the law for extending filing deadlines.
- Form 700s filed late are subject to late fees of \$10 per day, up to a maximum of \$100, for each filing required.
- Per San Francisco Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code Section 3.1-102.5(c),
 members of City boards or commissions who have failed to file Form 700 and/or the
 Ethics and Sunshine Ordinance Training Declaration Form by the applicable filing deadline
 are disqualified from participating in or voting on matters listed on their boards' and
 commissions' meeting agendas until the filing requirements are met.
- The Ethics Commission and the Fair Political Practices Commission have authority to initiate
 administrative enforcement action against any filer whose Form 700 filing is more than 30
 days late, with potential fines of up to \$5,000 per violation. Willful failure to file may be
 pursued as a misdemeanor.
- Non-filers may be subject to disciplinary action by his or her appointing authority, including removal from office or termination of employment.

Law enforcement agencies are joining together to implement a coordinated response throughout the criminal justice system to prevent repeat offenses

San Francisco, CA — Today, San Francisco Mayor London N. Breed, District Attorney Chesa Boudin, Police Chief Bill Scott, Sheriff Paul Miyamoto, and Adult Probation Chief Karen Fletcher announced two initiatives to prevent repeat offenses and gun violence in San Francisco. The first is an agreement among the justice partners to implement coordinated efforts to prevent individuals from committing repeat offenses in San Francisco. The second is an initiative is aimed at preventing gun violence as part of an effort with the San Francisco Police Department and San Francisco's Street Violence Intervention Program.

"To confront the public safety challenges we face in San Francisco, we all need to acknowledge where we are falling short and where we can work together to do more," said Mayor Breed. "Whether it's dealing with the challenges around people committing repeat offenses and ending up back on our streets, or the struggles we are having with gun violence in many parts of our City, we need creative and collaborative solutions. I appreciate the leaders of our public safety departments coming together to focus on keeping our City and our residents safe."

Coordinating Responses to Prevent Repeat Offenses

The first initiative, which is a partnership between Sheriff Miyamoto, Police Chief Scott, District Attorney Boudin, and Adult Probation Chief Fletcher, will coordinate efforts to prevent individuals from committing repeat offenses in San Francisco. As each of these agencies plays a critical role in public safety in the City, each agency has committed to improved communication to support swift and coordinated responses designed to promote public safety.

Included in this coordinated effort are plans to:

- Develop communication tools across agencies to inform one another of identified persons who have committed repeated, recent offenses in the same category of crime;
- Ensure that when persons are booked into jail, their probation, parole, and/or federal probation status as well as the existence of any warrants will be immediately confirmed and communicated to justice partners;
- Ensure that every booking notification is reviewed and evaluated;
- Establish verification processes to ensure that holds are placed each and every time someone is arrested while on probation or parole;
- Communicate across agencies regarding any contextual information or specific issues that may warrant consideration for detention;
- Provide updated information to the Court regarding any previous noncompliance with court orders regarding conditions of release, including any failures to comply with electronic monitoring; and
- Establish communication procedures both to and from justice partners regarding any decisions to refer a case to another agency and any updates as to actions taken by that agency.

In addition to this effort, Mayor Breed has arranged to provide additional staffing, including two additional prosecutors to ensure enhanced interagency communication and coordination.

"In January, I convened a meeting of justice partners to begin the discussion of how we can better communicate to ensure that we are all coordinating our efforts rather than working in silos," said District Attorney Boudin. "I am so pleased that we have all come together to commit to this collaborative approach to promoting public safety."

"These initiatives address immediate concerns on balancing community safety with a fair and equitable justice system," said Sheriff Miyamoto. "Our collaboration on connecting processes among public safety agencies leverages the collective experience of the City's public safety leaders. Our deputies will continue to communicate with our criminal justice partners regarding the status of the people in our custody. Ultimately, we all want the community to be safer, and hold offenders accountable by offering opportunities to change behaviors while in the justice system. Holding people who reoffend in jail both protects public safety and provides the people in our custody with supportive programs and tailored treatment, increasing opportunities for a successful reentry."

Addressing Gun Violence through Targeted Interventions

The second initiative is a gun violence intervention program. San Francisco is receiving a \$1.5 million California Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant over the next three years to help reduce shootings, break the cycle of recidivism, and to build trust between the community and the Police Department.

The program will start by identifying individuals who are most at risk of either engaging in gun violence or falling victim to gun violence and will connect them with San Francisco's Street Violence Intervention Program (SVIP) to receive services and support. SVIP is on the ground, in the community, working with at-risk individuals by providing mentorship, guidance, and a path forward that does not involve violence. SVIP engages not only with the individual, but with their family and their support network to get them out of situations that can lead to violence and instead set them on a path to success.

The strategy that will be used in San Francisco draws explicitly from the Oakland Ceasefire strategy, the Boston Reentry Initiative, and the Chicago Project Safe Neighborhoods, all of which have been rigorously evaluated and found to be successful at significantly reducing severe violence and reducing the re-arrest rate among participants as well.

Gun violence by the numbers in San Francisco:

- 85% of those impacted by gun violence are Black and Latino men, even though they comprise less than 10% of the City's total population.
- 29% of all violent firearm crimes in 2019 took place in San Francisco's Bayview, Potrero Hill, and Visitacion Valley neighborhoods, with a quarter of all the City's homicides for the past five years occurring there.
- Those at the highest risk of gun violence in San Francisco are primarily Black and Latino men, ages 18-35, with justice-involvement and social connections to each other.

"Although our criminal justice system comprises multiple agencies with different responsibilities, Mayor Breed's initiatives rightly recognize the shared responsibility we have to forge the best informed, most mutually cooperative partnerships possible to keep our City safe," said Chief of Police Bill Scott. "We're grateful to Mayor Breed for her leadership to better coordinate San Francisco's approach to break the cycle of recidivism by prolific offenders and stem the tide of gun violence. We're also thankful to District Attorney Chesa Boudin, Sheriff Paul Miyamoto and Chief Karen Fletcher for partnering on these efforts."

SAN FRANCISCO MOVES TO PHASE 1B OF COVID-19 VACCINATIONS, EXPANDS ELIGIBILITY TO EDUCATORS, CHILD CARE, EMERGENCY SERVICES, FOOD AND AGRICULTURE WORKERS

Vaccine supply remains limited, but more San Franciscans and workers are now eligible to make appointments for vaccination as they become available

San Francisco, CA — Today, San Francisco moved into Phase 1B, of the State's COVID-19 vaccination prioritization plan. This move to Phase 1B expands vaccine eligibility to people who live or work in San Francisco in the following sectors: education and childcare, emergency services, and food and agriculture. Despite this expanded eligibility, vaccine doses remain in short supply, and healthcare providers have been advised to prioritize second doses in the coming weeks. As such, appointments for first vaccine doses are limited, and people who are eligible may not be able to get appointments right away.

Phase 1B includes more than 168,000 individuals who live or work in San Francisco, in addition to the approximately 210,000 healthcare workers and people 65 and older who are already eligible. People who are eligible to be vaccinated can sign-up for an appointment as they become available at: SF.gov/getvaccinated.

"Getting people who live and work in San Francisco vaccinated as quickly as possible will

help us keep our entire community safe and save lives," said Mayor Breed. "We've been dealing with this pandemic for a year now, and throughout that time, our workforce has kept the City going. From the grocery store clerks, child care providers and teachers, to emergency workers and restaurant cooks and waiters, these frontline workers have showed up for all of us, and I'm glad we're able to move forward with expanding vaccine eligibility to include them. While appointments are still very limited due to supply, we're ready to ramp up our vaccination sites and open up appointments as we get more vaccine doses."

In partnership with the healthcare providers in San Francisco, which are receiving the majority of the vaccine doses from the state, the City is facilitating the quick and efficient delivery of vaccines through high-volume vaccine sites, neighborhood vaccine access sites, community clinics, pharmacy partnerships, and mobile vaccination teams. This network of COVID-19 vaccination sites in San Francisco provides the capacity to vaccinate at least 10,000 people per day, pending supply.

The insufficient and inconsistent supply of COVID-19 vaccine continues to be the biggest barrier for vaccinating people quickly in San Francisco. The increase in second dose appointments puts additional strain on San Francisco's COVID-19 vaccination network. As more people become eligible for their second doses of the COVID-19 vaccine and yet supply does not increase significantly, health care providers are unable to offer as many first dose appointments.

Over the last week, an average of 4,000 to 4,500 second and first vaccine doses a day have been administered in San Francisco. Although this rate of vaccinations is lower than what San Francisco is capable of, health care providers and DPH are still making good progress, with 18% of San Franciscans 16 and older having received their first dose, and are ready to ramp up vaccinations as supply increases and becomes more predictable.

"By making the COVID vaccine available to the essential workers of Phase 1B, we acknowledge those who have bravely continued to risk their safety to care for our children, patrol our streets, and stock our shelves with food throughout this pandemic," said Dr. Grant Colfax, Director of Public Health. "And as we offer the protection of the vaccine to these individuals, many of whom are low income earners, people of color, and immigrants, we will also be advancing racial and social equity through access to the vaccine."

In addition to expanding vaccine eligibility to people in Phase 1B, San Francisco health care providers and the Department of Public Health continue to vaccinate people 65 and older. To-date, San Francisco has vaccinated 80% of the approximately 210,000 healthcare workers and people 65 and older who are eligible under Phase 1A. 58% percent of San Franciscans 65 and older have received at least one dose.

San Francisco also remains committed to an equitable vaccination strategy, with a specific focus on reaching populations that have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. To that end, the San Francisco Department of Public Health has been focused on reaching communities that have been hard-hit by the pandemic, including the Latino community and neighborhoods in the Southeast of the city. San Francisco has located high volume sites and neighborhood vaccine access sites in areas that have carried the burden of the virus, and is implementing other strategies to reach the most vulnerable populations where they are, including mobile vaccination teams.

San Francisco's COVID-19 Command Center recently published a new vaccine dashboard that shows DPH-controlled vaccine distribution, including by age and race/ethnicity. This data includes vaccinations administered at Laguna Honda Hospital, Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, San Francisco Health Network clinics, as well as neighborhood vaccine access sites operated in partnership with community-based organizations. The dashboard shows that DPH's focus on racial equity in vaccine distribution has been successful. A higher proportion of the DPH-administered vaccinations have gone to people of color than the total citywide vaccinations. For example, 16.6% of the DPH vaccine allocation has gone to the Latinx population compared with 8.8% of citywide vaccinations.

"Our workforce has been maintaining our critical infrastructure, keeping us safe and providing the vital services our city needs since Mayor Breed's emergency declaration in February 2020," said Carol Isen, Acting Human Resources Director. "Now that we have a safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine to help put an end to COVID-19, I am in full support of taking this essential step of vaccinating our emergency services workforce, for their protection and for the safety of the entire San Francisco community. I am thrilled that the employees who are essential to keeping the City's basic life safety systems and activities will now be eligible to get the vaccine."

"San Francisco's emergency service workers, teachers, childcare professionals, and food service workers are now eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. This is an exciting and important milestone in the fight against the virus," said Mary Ellen Carroll, Executive Director of the Department of Emergency Management. "I am especially thankful that San Francisco's 911 dispatchers, emergency managers, police officers and the hundreds of disaster service workers at the COVID Command Center or in the field supporting operations can now have access to vaccine. Since January 2020, these dedicated public servants have answered the call of duty to perform lifesaving work in our collective fight against COVID. Starting today they will have the opportunity to be vaccinated, and protected from the virus, so they can continue serving residents and workers of the City and County of San Francisco."

Anyone who works or lives in San Francisco can sign up for a notification when they are eligible for vaccination at <u>SF.gov/vaccinenotify</u>. The City will continue to provide regular updates to the public about the vaccine in San Francisco at: <u>SF.gov/covidvaccine</u>.

The adverse effects of artificial light are well known in the scientific community and the wheel has had their lights turned on 24/7 since it was installed.


As you know, an Environmental Impact Report was never performed on the impact of the Wheel on wildlife in the Park.

Dear Commissioners:

I am writing in regard to the Ferris wheel that is currently in Golden Gate Park. I understand this commission must approve any plans for its continued presence.

Because this is also a Recreation and Parks Department matter, I would like to bring to your attention to that department's failure to abide by the applicable rules.

About a year ago, I contacted Elizabeth Gordon-Jonckheer in the Planning Department about the mysterious installation of a fence in Civic Center Plaza. The fence in question is a requirement made by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control for the issuance of a permit to sell alcohol at the Bi-Rite kiosk directly adjacent to one of the two Helen Diller Playgrounds on the Plaza.

When I contacted Ms. Gordon-Jonckheer I was concerned about two specific issues: the decision to sell alcohol next to a playground, and the installation of a fence that effectively privatized approximately 5,000 square feet of the Plaza. At the time, I was unable to locate a permit on file with the Department of Building Inspection that showed the scope of the work and the approval of the finished project by that department. What I did find, however, is that the original permit for the construction of the (temporary) kiosk. That permit (attached) states that "no alteration or reconstruction of City Right-of-Way" is granted or permitted. The fence clearly alters the right-of-way.

In addition to installing the fence in violation of the terms of the original permit for the kiosk, the parties responsible for that installation failed to bring the issue up with the Historic Preservation Commission. In other words, this commission did not approve that installation. Ms. Gordon-Jonckheer told me that because it was not approved (nor, based on design, would it have been), the fence must be removed. I realize the city has had a lot of other things on its mind since shortly after that conversation, but I want to bring the matter to your attention to ensure that it will be removed. Additionally, I would like to use this to point out that Rec and Park regularly flouts convention, policy, and law when they decide to go ahead with a project. I will provide two examples, related by their proximity to each other.

The construction of the kiosk itself violates the City Charter provision that requires construction of buildings on park land to be approved by plebiscite. Rec and Park Department staff have told me they do not have to abide by the City Charter. They did not indicate how they came to that conclusion nor why that might makes sense.

The fences around the two Diller Playgrounds violate state law. California Health and Safety Code, Section 115725, requires playgrounds to be fenced in such a way as to prevent children from climbing a fence, squeezing through openings (in it or under it) and running away from a play area and into a street or nearby body of water. The law is based on ASTM standards: "To prevent children from passing through the fence, the vertical members of the fence should be spaced 4" apart or less." The diamond-shaped openings in the current fences measure approximately 18" by 42" on the diagonals and, thus, vastly exceed that standard. On three occasions Rec and Park Director Phil Ginsburg told me and the Recreation and Park Commission that state law does not apply to those two playgrounds. Because of the nature of public comment, it was impossible for me to ask why that would or should be the case. The certified playground inspector who approved the final playground told me on the phone that he has in the past agreed to accept non-compliant fences because parents did not like how they look. Correspondence between the Trust for Public Land and me reveals that the Trust was solely interested in esthetics and not the safety of children. Staff at both the National Recreation and Park Association and the California Parks and Recreation Society indicated the matter should be taken up by the District Attorney. I did not contact that office, but via email I did remind a deputy city attorney who had been included in some email exchanges that the city will have a significant liability when a child is lost, traumatize or injured because of the non-conforming fences.

The Department of Recreation and Parks is secretive and duplicitous in much of its decision making regarding the use of public lands and often does not operate with the public good in mind. The presence of the Ferris wheel in Golden Gate Park is one more example of the department's poor decision making and irresponsible stewardship.

Because they have expressed concerns about the Ferris wheel I am CC-ing Supervisors

Preston and Chan. Also, I am cc-ing Ms. Gordon-Jonckheer since she was involved in the discussions last year.

Dear Supervisor, Commissioner, or other reader,

The SkyStar Wheel in Golden Gate Park is overall a net negative to our communities. I oppose any extended period of operation for the ferris wheel, especially a four year extension or any long-term running of the lights. Due to its location, one of the major issues with the ferris wheel is the light and noise pollution to the surrounding areas. It is an ecological disturbance to the wildlife in the area which our communities value so greatly.

We have so much wildlife diversity in SF. We have birds, bats, bugs, and babies. As with many others looking for respite during a pandemic, I've spent most of my free time in Golden Gate Park this last year. The appreciation the local community has for our park areas is simply astounding. This is largely thanks to the biological and cultural diversities that our city prides itself upon so often.

The ferris wheel threatens our values and diversity. The light pollution contributes to the disappearance of the bottom of the food chain. The chain starts to break apart without our small insects, birds, and bats. Plants rely on them to spread out and flower. Butterflies which make the news so often as disappearing depend on the plants. Some of the millions of birds that flyover every year will get lost by the light, or have less food at their rest area. Besides the animals passing through, many make this their home and nest here. Turns out nobody likes a giant bright light shining through their window.

There are many negative cascading effects, but one of them is also that the happiness of

our park visitors may suffer. One of my favorite spots within close visual and audible range of the Skystar Wheel is Stow Lake. This is a very popular spot to go for a leisurely stroll and one of the many areas that are affected by the wheel. I have been there ~50 times in the last year.

During my visits, the first thing I observe is the joy on everyone's faces. This is a safe and soothing environment for people to spend time alone or with their loved ones. People of all backgrounds and ages walk the lake at all hours of the day. It's a place where we can get away from the intensities and tensions of city life.

One thing everyone notices is all the life, the lake is a loop infused with a beautiful biodiversity of both native and exotic plants and animals. It's a bubble that we can all be a part of without fear or consequence.

If you go out there today, you can see herons flying all around and gathering material to build and repair their nests for the new spring season. Above them on Strawberry Hill, bats and smaller singing birds fly around eating all the bugs they can find. This is an already dwindling food source. Below the herons, luminescent swallows do the same, zipping and zapping for food in impressive displays as pedestrians rest on nearby benches. As we relax, we are immersed in dazzling and aromatic flowers and plants. This isn't just sensory candy for us, this helps build habitat for the ducks we all love to break rules for and feed.

Year round, I see people point out wonders along the lake, learn more about the world near them, and ask questions. Let's keep this bubble and ecosystem that we love healthy and alive. Let's continue to have an amazing and accessible area for all to come and enjoy. Isn't it worth it to protect it from the noise and light pollution of the wheel?

MAYOR LONDON BREED ANNOUNCES \$2.5 MILLION EXPANSION OF THE AFRICAN AMERICAN SMALL BUSINESS REVOLVING LOAN FUND

Philanthropic support from Aneel Bhusri and the San Francisco Foundation will increase the number of small businesses assisted by the fund to an estimated 150, and brings the total funding for the African American Small Business Revolving Loan Fund to \$6.3 million

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed, the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), Main Street Launch, and the San Francisco African American Chamber of Commerce today announced a third significant investment of \$2.5 million in the City's African American Small Business Revolving Loan Fund (AARLF). The historic fund was established by Mayor Breed to address the perilous position of many Black-owned and Black-serving San Francisco businesses resulting from disproportionate impacts of the pandemic.

This latest expansion of the AARLF is made possible through the continued support of the San Francisco Foundation and the generosity of Aneel Bhusri, Chief Executive Officer of Workday. The additional investment brings the total secured funding to \$6.3 million and will enable the Fund to support an estimated 150 businesses.

"This has been such a difficult year for small businesses across San Francisco, and sadly,

Black-owned businesses across the country have been especially hard hit and many have had to close their doors for good," said Mayor Breed. "Small businesses are going to be such a critical part of our city's recovery. As we look to the future of San Francisco, it's critical that our City programs keep focusing on equity and serving those communities that have been historically disadvantaged. I'm proud that with the help of our partners, the generous contributions of Aneel Bhusri, and Joaquín Torres's leadership at the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, we've been able to expand this fund and give businesses the resources that can help them survive this pandemic and come back even stronger."

"The San Francisco Foundation and our donors are committed to supporting Black businesses that have been systemically excluded from accessing capital," said Fred Blackwell, CEO of the San Francisco Foundation. "This fund will help Black residents build their wealth, and when Black, Indigenous, and people-of-color communities thrive, we all thrive."

The AARLF was created in June 2020 in partnership with the San Francisco African American Chamber of Commerce and community lending partner Main Street Launch as part of the City's comprehensive COVID-19 response for small businesses. The purpose of the Fund is to help stabilize San Francisco's Black-owned and Black-serving small businesses by meeting urgent capital needs brought on by sudden revenue loss from business disruption resulting from COVID-19. The program offers zero interest loans of up to \$50,000 for qualifying businesses, and no loan payments are due until 2022.

Since the pandemic, San Francisco has directed over \$24 million in grants and loans to support more than 1,200 small businesses, and recently announced a new \$62 million plan to provide ongoing relief and recovery support to small businesses. The investments reflect the City's commitment to ensuring a more equitable recovery and inclusive future economy.

The African American Small Business Revolving Loan Fund complements San Francisco's citywide COVID-19 financial relief package of grants and loans to support micro-enterprises and small businesses historically underserved by private banks and other traditional sources of financing. The City created its first zero interest loan program, the San Francisco Hardship Emergency Loan Program (SF HELP), in April 2020. SF HELP has now funded more than \$12 million in loans and programming for businesses citywide. The AARLF followed this program design, and San Francisco has now successfully delivered over \$4 million in grants and loans to Asian-Pacific Islander (API) businesses citywide and created the Latino Small Business Fund focused on providing similar support to Latino-serving small businesses.

"Stabilizing San Francisco's Black-owned and Black-serving businesses is essential to our City's ongoing cultural and economic vitality. These restaurants, hair salons, fitness studios, bike shops, and other businesses support and anchor our Black communities as important social and economic hubs," said Assessor Joaquín Torres, who is a member of the City's Economic Recovery Task Force. "The further expansion of the African American Revolving Loan Fund honors Black History Month by recognizing the racial inequities and adversities that have faced and sadly continue to face Black businesses here while at the same time lifting them up and valuing their contributions by investing in their futures."

Nationally, one in five Black businesses have been impacted or closed due to the pandemic according to a May 2020 Working Paper published by the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research studying the impact of COVID-19 on small businesses. The Small Business Administration's Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) awarded less than one quarter of one

percent (0.25%) of the \$3.2 billion in forgivable PPP loans issued in San Francisco to Black-owned businesses. Only 33 self-identified Black-owned businesses reported receiving PPP awards.

AARLF funds have been prioritized for long-standing San Francisco Black-owned and Black-serving businesses, especially those businesses most impacted by COVID-19 including those whose operations have been severely limited since the Stay at Home Order was issued in March such as hair salons, barber shops and other personal services, gyms and personal fitness. Funds can be used to pay for rent, payroll, equipment and machinery, inventory, furniture and fixtures, tenant improvements, and COVID-19 related expenses including marketing and improving online presence and reopening costs.

"Being a black business owner, the loan came through at the right time and in the right amount. It couldn't have come any better, I can't even describe it, it meant a lot to me, it was a blessing," said Lloyd Lacy, owner of Lacy's Barber Shop in the Ocean View, Merced Heights, Ingleside neighborhood. "I was able to pay all my outstanding debts including my backed up rent and was able to put in the floor tiles that I had been sitting on for two years. I added new chairs, sinks, mirrors and repainted my cabinets. If I hadn't received the loan I would be at risk of losing my business."

Approximately \$1.3 million from the \$2.5 million in new funding will be used to leverage additional private sector funding to offer upwards of an additional 30 businesses zero interest loans. This increases the estimated total businesses that will benefit to 150, supporting an estimated 490 jobs. The remaining balance of \$1.2 million will be used to provide full debt relief ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000 for an estimated 30 longstanding businesses who have benefited from the fund. These debt relief payments will then allow for immediate recirculation, enabling additional loans to Black owned or serving small businesses.

The AARLF received 391 applications during a two-week application period, totaling approximately \$16 million in funding sought. An initial round of 40 eligible businesses were selected for awards and have now been awarded more than \$1 million dollars. Fifty-six percent of recipients are women-owned businesses, far exceeding the approximately 34% of businesses in San Francisco that are women-owned.

"One of the most precious gifts we can give each other is the gift of being seen. Mayor Breed's implementation of the historic African American Small Business Revolving Loan Relief Fund is a result of her seeing first hand the devastating effects COVID-19 and gentrification have had on Black owned small businesses in San Francisco," said Nikki Cooper, owner of Two Jack's Nik's Place in the Western Addition. "Having access to capital from the AARLF has given me the very real support I need to continue operating my business during these challenging and uncertain times."

Additional funds were added to the AARLF in August 2020 and a second round of 40 businesses was subsequently selected and moved forward in the loan process. These businesses have received approximately \$500,000 in loan funding so far, and another \$650,000 in loan requests has proceeded to the underwriting stage of the process. Currently, applicants with loans pending, approved, and funded now total over \$2 million. A third round of approximately 50 additional businesses is now moving forward in conjunction with this latest investment in the fund. Funding will continue to be disbursed to eligible businesses by Main Street Launch.

A huge wheel that is lit up at night and has noisy and smelly generators is the opposite of "an urban pastoral retreat, a semblance of nature." More importantly, there is wildlife like bats and owls that rely on the dark skies for survival to hunt and other birds that rely on night skies for migration. At the very least, the generator and lights should be shut off at sunset so the wildlife can have some peace and quiet. (Haven't we done enough damage to our natural world already?!)

We are in desperate need for more natural peace and quiet in an increasingly crowded and noisy

city. One of the reasons San Francisco (and the Bay Area) is so desirable is because we have protected natural areas that could have easily been paved over and monetized. Please don't do that to our city gem, Golden Gate park.

Thank you for your principled stand in questioning the need for a four year extension for the Wheel. I am a senior and I go to GGP every week to practice Tai Chi and find some needed peace and quiet in nature. It is an important part of my life and health. As a 30 year resident of the outer Richmond, I would like to share some of my concerns.

- 1. The buildings, facilities, roads, parking lots, golf course, Polo Field, and many other activities (soccer fields, dog run, lawn bowls, tennis courts, playgrounds, baseball diamonds, etc.) leave very little space to just be in a park. There are probably only a few hundred acres left of actual parkland for people to experience. Every additional electric light and foot of concrete poured diminish and degrade what little parkland we have left.
- 2. Regarding the free tickets made available to underprivileged communities as a reason to keep the Wheel in place: "The most vulnerable and disadvantaged families" as one caller to the Rec and Park Commission described them, need computers, access to education, good nutrition, healthcare, clothing and shelter if they're homeless, sports venues and parks in their neighborhood more than

they need a Ferris Wheel in GGP. It is shameful that some would exploit underprivileged children by using them in a public relations campaign for Rec and Park and SkyStar.

- 3. A better way to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of Golden Gate Park would be to keep the Park as dark and quiet as safety allows. We should honor the natural environment of the Park. The SkyStar Wheel is an intrusive structure that can be seen above the treeline from miles away and is inappropriate for this historic setting. We should not be sending a message that carnival attractions are more important than our beautiful Park.
- 4. Our parks are not an inexhaustible resource and they are already stressed. Golden Gate Park is one of the few places in San Francisco where wildlife can find a refuge. Wildlife needs darkness at night. The health of our environment and the future of planet Earth depend on mitigating the impact of human activity on the natural environment. The increased artificial lighting from the Wheel has a negative impact on birds and other wildlife. Humans are also adversely affected by artificial light pollution.

Please do not support an extension for the Wheel to stay for more than one year. Thank you for devoting time to this important issue.

By providing a fun, COVID-safe activity in the Music Concourse, the Wheel adds to the sense that Golden Gate Park is truly everybody's park. The east end of the park is full of wonderful activities and cultural institutions, and while the trails, meadows and wooded areas of the west end of the park provide acres and acres where people can escape the hubbub of the city and enjoy nature. With this combination there is truly something for everyone to do in Golden Gate Park.

I know that the Wheel needs to be closed right now for health reasons, but my family and I are looking forward to riding it when it is safe again to do so. Even closed it makes the Music Concourse

a nice place to visit and get outside, and when it reopens it will be a wonderful place to belatedly celebrate the 150thAnniversary of our beloved park.

Starting Tuesday, February 23, the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency will offer free Muni trips and expanded Essential Trip Card credit for customers traveling to and from COVID-19 vaccination sites in San Francisco

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed today announced the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) will offer free, roundtrip transportation for people traveling to receive their COVID-19 vaccine. This program is part of the City's efforts to make it as convenient as possible for people to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, and complements the City's strategy to deliver vaccines equitably and locate vaccination sites in areas that are accessible by public transportation.

"We've created a network of COVID-19 vaccination sites in San Francisco with the capacity to vaccinate at least 10,000 people a day and we're working to bring vaccines to those communities that have been most impacted. In addition to reaching our most vulnerable people with a combination of mobile vaccination teams, neighborhood sites, and community clinics, we want to make it as convenient as possible for people throughout San Francisco to get to our high-volume vaccination sites," said Mayor Breed. "Thanks to the SFMTA, we're making roundtrip travel to vaccination appointments free and further reducing the barriers that might keep someone from getting vaccinated. The easier we make it for people to get vaccinated, the quicker we can put an end to this pandemic and get on the road to recovery."

Starting on Tuesday, February 23, anyone traveling to receive their vaccination will be able to ride Muni to and from their appointment for free, regardless of which site they go to. This includes the City's high-volume vaccination sites, neighborhood vaccine access sites, Department of Public Health clinics, pharmacies offering vaccinations, as well as vaccination sites outside of San Francisco.

Customers on Muni traveling to and from a COVID-19 vaccination site will need to show their appointment confirmation or vaccine card as "proof of payment." Electronic appointment confirmations, such as an email or photo will be accepted.

"Getting San Franciscans vaccinated is the City's highest priority at the moment, and we're doing our part to support saving lives and saving jobs," said Jeffrey Tumlin, SFMTA Director of Transportation. "By allowing free Muni access to and from all vaccination sites, we are eliminating transportation and cost barriers from receiving this life-changing vaccine."

In addition to making Muni free for travel to and from vaccination sites, starting on Tuesday, February 23, SFMTA will increase the amount of service available to Essential Trip Card (ETC) participants by \$60. The ETC is a discount program to help seniors and people with disabilities make essential trips in taxis during the COVID-19 pandemic. ETC participants will receive an email and/or phone call with instructions on how to load the additional credit to their card. Older adults or persons with disabilities may apply for the ETC program by calling 311 and mentioning the program.

Paratransit rides will also be free to and from vaccination sites within SF Paratransit's service area.

Health care providers in San Francisco and the Department of Public Health are currently vaccinating people 65 and older and health care workers. The City has developed a webpage for people who live and work in San Francisco to find vaccination sites in San Francisco and book appointments. People who are eligible to be vaccinated can sign-up for an appointment at: <u>SF.gov/getvaccinated</u>. Anyone who works or lives in San Francisco can sign up for a notification when they are eligible for vaccination at <u>SF.gov/vaccinenotify</u>.

Brown brings years of experience in community organizing and local government, as well as a commitment to equity and supporting arts and culture organizations, to San Francisco's Grants for the Arts

San Francisco, CA — Today Mayor London N. Breed and City Administrator Carmen Chu appointed Vallie Brown as the new Director for San Francisco's Grants for the Arts. Brown most recently served the City and County of San Francisco as Supervisor of District 5.

Grants for the Arts (GFTA), a division of the City and County of San Francisco's City Administrator's Office, strives to be a stable, dependable resource for nonprofit arts and culture organizations who successfully meet funding criteria, and is committed to supporting the full spectrum of art and culture in San Francisco. GFTA's investments enhance the City's attractiveness to visitors and provide employment and enrichment to residents, which will be especially important for San Francisco's recovery from COVID-19. GFTA's total general operating support grant amount for Fiscal Year 2020 was \$12.9 million, and increased funding for small- and medium-sized organizations by 28% over the previous year.

"Vallie Brown is a dedicated public servant, with a passion for community and the arts in San Francisco," said Mayor Breed. "She came to San Francisco as an artist more than 30 years

ago, and built a community through the Arts which ultimately led her on a path to community organizing and public service. She and I met when I was still executive director at the African American Arts & Culture Complex. We worked closely together there and later when I became Supervisor, to achieve more equitable funding across large and small arts organizations. Her extensive experience and steady hand will serve San Francisco's arts community well as we navigate the challenges created by COVID-19 and work to recover as a city."

Brown served as District 5 Supervisor from July 2018 until December 2019. Prior to her appointment to the Board of Supervisors, she worked for the San Francisco Office of Economic and Workforce Development and was a legislative aide to former District 5 supervisors Ross Mirkarimi and London Breed. As an aide during the 2008 economic crisis, she worked closely with community and arts organizations to preserve vital arts programs for diverse communities. Later, in 2013, she worked closely with then Supervisor Breed to promote greater equity at Grants for the Arts, helping restructure the department's support of small arts organizations, programs and artists.

"I came to San Francisco as an artist and the arts have always been at the center of my love for this city, along with its diverse communities," said Vallie Brown. "Grants for the Arts blends my love of and experience with communities, culture and the arts, all of which set San Francisco apart from other cities across the country. As we seek to recover, arts and culture are going to be a vital ingredient and I'm eager to do everything I can to support them during these incredibly trying times."

The mission of GFTA is to promote the City by supporting the arts through six grant programs, with general operating support grants making up the vast majority of its total grantmaking. Today, GFTA's principal value is equity, entailing a commitment to ensuring GFTA's grants and resources are accessible to all, understanding that certain communities have been historically overserved due to systemic advantages and access. Recognizing that arts organizations have not received equitable resources due to race, geography, and other marginalizing factors, GFTA endeavors to bolster culturally diverse and geographically dispersed organizations by eliminating obstacles and shortfalls in grantmaking that have prevented the full participation, success, and stability of applicants and grantees.

"I am excited to work with Vallie in this new role. As an artist who came to San Francisco over 30 years ago, Vallie understands firsthand the importance of arts and culture in our City's vitality and economic recovery," said City Administrator Carmen Chu and Co-chair of the Economic Recovery Task Force. "She's also passionate about serving our City and has a clear vision about how we advance and align our City's vision of equity and diversity with our work."

As a legislative aide and appointed Supervisor, Brown worked hard to promote culture and equity, including through her steadfast leadership and support for establishment of an American Indian Cultural Center in San Francisco, and her co-authorship of legislation establishing San Francisco's Office of Racial Equity.

"We trust Vallie, for over a decade she has successfully secured funding for small arts organizations, community events/festivals and individual artists in the black community," said Melonie and Melorra Green, Co-Directors, African American Arts & Cultural Complex. "This is a huge win for the arts community, those who appreciate the power of creativity, and those

who are generally interested in effective change in the arts ecosystem in San Francisco and beyond"

"Several years ago, Grants for the Arts shifted to prioritize equity and to do more to sustain and grow small arts and cultural organizations," said Rosa De Anda founder of "Day of the Dead Festival of Alters." "Vallie helped realize that change in City Hall which has been a huge help in keeping the fabric of San Francisco's arts community strong."

"Over the years, GFTA support for small arts organizations like mine have been so important," said Brenda Aoki, co-director of First Voice. "My co-director Mark Izu & I have known Vallie through her years of work in the Japan Town and Fillmore communities. Her work has helped to strengthen the bonds between these communities, and to promote healing. Her style of leadership, informed by her American Indian culture; is exactly what San Francisco needs right now, not just economic recovery, but food for the soul."

Prior to her work for the City and County of San Francisco, Brown was a working artist for many years, during which time she started a children's art program in the early 1990s at the Hunters Point Boys & Girls Club. It was through this work that she became an environmental activist fighting to close down the Hunter's Point power plant and to hold the Hunter's Point Shipyard accountable for its legacy of toxic pollution in the area.

Brown was raised in Utah by a single mother and grandmother. Her father was Paiute and Shoshone descent; he passed away when she was a child. Brown studied art and communications at the University of Utah, and now lives in Cole Valley.

Dear Michelle,

Thank you for your work yesterday in facilitating a long and detailed hearing.

I am following up by email on my 45-second statement at the tail end of yesterday afternoon's 3+ hour remote meeting because only one person, Commissioner Kate Black, was present to hear my statement, which had been prepared at the 3-minute limit allowed for each public comment, but was subsequently, nearly 3 hours into the meeting, curtailed to one minute, and then cut off by the chime at 45 seconds.

Please read and forward to the Historic Preservation Commission and relevant SF Planning staff my full statement here below.

++++++++++

Hello. My name is Ellen Brown. I live at 1274A 8th Avenue, in the Inner Sunset.

I would like to address several points in SF Planning's Request for a Certificate of Appropriateness to extend the operation of the temporary observation wheel at the GGP Music Concourse from the initial one year to an additional four years.

Under Compliance with Planning Code, "Applicable Preservation Standards," your first bullet point states that "the proposed project will occur on a previously ... non-contributing portion of Landmark No 249 [the Music Concourse]. I would like to point out that open urban space which is green and quiet and free of pollution is not "non-contributing," despite the language of SF Planning's request.

I would like to ask, how will the Music Concourse resume outdoor music performance, as intended, if it has to compete with the drone of the diesel generator that powers the observation wheel 24/7?

Regarding the neighboring John McLaren Memorial Rhododendron Dell, which is not a part of Landmark No 249 and thus has not received due consideration, the thrum of the generator has shattered the peace of that place.

Also, when I walk Music Concourse Drive along the pedestrian path that parallels the wheel, diesel exhaust from the generator penetrates the double mask that I wear for Covid protection.

Your third bullet point states that "the project will not result in the physical alteration of contributing elements or character defining features of the landmark."

Generator noise, pollution, flashing lights, and the size of the structure (150 ft. high and 130 ft. in diameter), towering over all other landmarks and visible from more than a mile away, are all "physical alterations," which can be seen, heard and smelled. They can also impede bats and birds in their nightly and annual feeding and migrations. How are these alterations not physical?

Regarding your third and fourth bullet points referring to matters of "character," this amusement park attraction and moneymaker for a firm in St Louis was always out of character with its surroundings, which constitute a temple and a sanctuary for trees, plants, wildlife, people, the arts, culture, and sciences. To permit it in one festival year without environmental review is perhaps forgivable. To extend it another four years without environmental review is a travesty.

Finally, under "Public Neighborhood Input," it would seem SF Planning and the Historic Preservation Commission are devoted to ignoring reasonable public and expert opposition to the extension of this project, seeking to bolster support with lightweight comments regarding "fun in a pandemic" and "increased activity"—not a good in itself—while disregarding the serious and legitimate concerns of thoughtful people, and even making it difficult for the public to speak at the hearing, by putting their issue to the end of the agenda and reducing their statement time with no notice, as I stated above, from 3 minutes to less than one minute.

This sort of behavior is analogous to voter suppression. It is anti-democratic and not at all in keeping with the role of trusted public servants (i.e., city staff and volunteers) such as you and your colleagues. It is not what I would expect of the City of Saint Francis as a community.

Thank you for your time and attention. I look forward to a response from SF Planning and the Historic Preservation Commission.

Commissioners:

Thank you for having imposed a one-year limit on the COA granted in Jan. 2020 for the observation wheel in the Music Concourse in Golden Gate Park.

I write to oppose RPD's request for "a four year operational extension of the observation wheel at the Music Concourse", and support termination of the wheel's operation and presence in the park as was originally scheduled. The reasons I oppose the request are many, but I will emphasize only three.

1) In the documents presented to the HPC on Jan 15 2020, Planning Staff state that the project meets the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. That is unclear.

I call your attention to Standard 1: "A property shall be used for its historic purpose or be placed in a new use that requires minimal change to the defining characteristics of the building and its site and environment."

Planning's response: The proposal will retain the historic use as a park and outdoor event space of the Music Concourse. Although permanent installation of the wheel would result in a significant change to the look, feel, and use of the Music Concourse Area, the extension of the temporary installation of the proposed observation wheel will not permanently change the landscape's distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships.

And to Standard 9, the statement of which includes:

"The new work shall be differentiated from the old and shall be compatible with the massing, size, scale, and architectural features to protect the historic integrity of the property and its environment."

Planning's response: (underlining mine)

The wheel's height, large footprint, and illumination are <u>not compatible</u> with the massing, scale, character, spatial organization, or defining features of the Music Concourse. At approximately 150 feet tall, the wheel is <u>not an appropriate addition to the formally designed Music Concourse landscape</u>; however, the proposal to extend the temporary operation of the observation wheel will not result in a permanent alteration of the historic landscape.

Excuse me? If permanent, it wouldn't meet Standard 1 or Standard 9, but because it's temporary we'll just ignore those inconvenient facts? This reasoning could be used to justify installing anything, anywhere, apparently for any length of time, as long as it's "temporary".

Besides, without having performed any environmental analysis of possible effects on biological resources, how does one know there would be no "permanent change" or "alteration" of the historic landscape which includes, as all landscapes do, plants and animals?

At most, I would call this <u>appearing</u> to obey the letter of the law. To me, it certainly does not obey the spirit of the law.

2. The Music Concourse is usually described as an "outdoors performance space" or "urban park landscape devoted to public performances and as a setting for public art" [Planning packet, Findings, item 3], not as an "outdoor event space" as in Standard 1. [What's the difference?

A <u>performance</u> would be expected to last for at most 4-5 hours (think of the longest Shakespeare play or opera imaginable.) I am told that Luciano Pavarotti and The Grateful Dead** have both performed in the Music Concourse. (**Possibly this

performance lasted even more than 5 hours, if they were on form!)

An <u>event</u>, on the other hand, is something that is expected to go on over a limited number of days at most. Bay to Breakers, the annual Pride Parade, "Hardly Strictly Bluegrass" and "Outside Lands" are events. Even the Exposition held in 1894 for 6 months was an event.

All performances are events but <u>not all events are performances</u>.]

An observation wheel running 12 hours a day (powered by a generator that runs 24/7) over a period of a year (let alone 4 years plus), is <u>neither a performance</u> nor <u>an event</u>. Once again, the wheel does NOT meet Standard 1.

3. I now call your attention to Step 5 of the CEQA Exemption Determination forms contained in the packet. Items 9 and 10 refer to considerations that apply to a Historic District. From 3. under Findings: "The Music Concourse also contributes to the National-Register listed Golden Gate Park historic district, significant under Criterion 1 (Events) and Criterion 3 (Architecture) in the areas of landscape architecture and social history". Why is neither box in Step 5 checked?

These points articulate just some of the reasons I contend this "project" should never have been approved in the first place. It should certainly NOT be approved for an extension.

Thank you for considering my concerns.

Hello,

I am a resident of the Inner Sunset and am opposed to an extension of the permit to operate this temporary attraction. The wheel is not currently operating in compliance with the original plans that were distributed in 2020 when it was approved for a temporary 10 month installation.

In that packet that was reviewed as part of the CUA the area of work was limited to a fenced area at the east end of the Music Concourse. This included two small generators within the fenced area.

In reality a much larger generator was installed outside of the approved area, in the center of an accessible walkway across the road. This generator is much larger than what was approved and runs twenty four hours a day. I have included a scaled site plan showing the actual location.

Temporary power for a 10 month installation is much different than a five year installation. It is

very low, polluting, and severely detracts from the experience of using the Music Concourse even when the wheel is closed (the generator has never been shut off, as far as I can tell, since being installed) Large trucks unload diesel fuel to refill it on a regular location.

If this historic public space is going to be leased to a private company to run an expensive for profit attraction it should at minimum be in compliance with the approved plans. If this is going to be extended by years, they should be required to tie into grid power within 6 months of the extension being granted.


