Reception:

This report outlines activities of the Department's Survey and Designation Team from October 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017 (Q2).

In October 2017, staff met with a consultant selected to serve as the lead author of the **Chinese American Experience in San Francisco Historic Context Statement**. The Chinese American Historical Society will serve as a community partner for the project and Architectural Resources Group will serve as project administrator. During November and December 2017, staff reviewed and commented on a draft outline prepared by the consultant and held regular discussions with the author and the Chinese American Historical Society on the scope of the project and the schedule.

On October 4, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Supervisors (BOS) approval of eight **Mills Act** historical property contract applications for: 215 and 229 Haight Street, 56 Potomac Street, 60-62 Carmelita Street, 101 Vallejo Street, 627 Waller Street, 940 Grove Street, 973 Market Street, and 1338 Filbert Street. The BOS approved the Mills Act applications 101 Vallejo Street, 627 Waller Street and 940 Grove Street on November 14, 2017. The BOS approved the Mills Act applications for 215 and 229 Haight Street and 973 Market Street on December 12, 2017. The Mills Act applications for 56 Potomac, 60-62 Carmelita Street, and 1338 Filbert Street were not moved out of committee so no BOS action was taken.

On October 16, 2017, the Land Use and Transportation Committee (LUC) of the BOS recommended approval of landmark designation of the **Gaughran House** (2731-2735 Folsom Street) to the full BOS. On November 28, 2017, the full BOS passed the ordinance on its first reading, and on December 5, 2017, finally passed the ordinance. The ordinance was signed by the Mayor on December 15, 2017.

On October 18, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution initiating landmark designation of **Theodore Roosevelt Middle School** (460 Arguello Boulevard), **George Washington High School** (600 32nd Avenue), and the former **Sunshine School** (2728 Bryant Street). These three nominations are a project of San Francisco Heritage and are being funded by the Historic Preservation Fund Committee; the designation reports were produced by consultants, Donna Graves and Chris VerPlanck. On November 2, 2017, staff and HPC President Wolfram and Commissioner Johnck conducted a site visit of George Washington High School and Roosevelt Middle School. On December 6, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution recommending landmark designation of all three properties to the BOS.

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On October 23, 2017, the LUC of the BOS voted unanimously to recommend landmark designation of **Third Baptist Church** (1399 McAllister Street) to the full BOS. The property was listed on the HPC's Landmark Designation Work Program (LDWP) and the designation report was staff-produced. On November 14, 2017, the full BOS voted unanimously to designate the property as a local landmark. On November 15, 2017, the Mayor signed the ordinance designating the Third Baptist Church Complex (1399 McAllister Street) as a local landmark.

On November 1, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution to initiate landmark designation of the **Diamond Heights Safety Wall**, located at the intersection of Diamond Heights Boulevard at Clipper Street. This is a communitysponsored landmark designation, nominated by Robert Pullum; the designation report was staff-produced. On December 20, 2017, Department staff and HPC President Andrew Wolfram conducted a site visit to the Diamond Heights Safety Wall. On December 20, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution recommending landmark designation of the Diamond Heights Safety Wall to the BOS.

On November 15, 2017, the Department received an email from the Board of Directors at Lighthouse Church, the owner of the former **Religious School for Congregation Temple Emanu-El** (1337 Sutter Street), regarding the pending landmark designation of the building. The Board of Directors indicated that they are not interested in pursuing landmark designation at this time. The property is currently on the HPC's Landmark Designation Work Program.

On December 6, 2017, Department staff and HPC Vice President Hyland and Commissioner Matsuda attended a site visit at the **Phillips Building** (236-246 1st Street). On December 6, 2017, the HPC adopted a resolution to initiate landmark designation. The designation report was produced for the property owner by consultant Architectural Resources Group.

On December 15, 2017, staff attended a site visit to the **Mother's Building** at the San Francisco Zoo. The property is listed on the LDWP.

On December 20, 2017 the HPC adopted a resolution recommending landmark designation of **Peace Pagoda and Peace Plaza** to the BOS. The property was listed on the HPC's Landmark Designation Work Program and the designation report was staff-produced.

On December 20, 2017, the HPC adopted the **Eureka Valley Historic Context Statement**, a project sponsored by the Eureka Valley Neighborhood Association and funded by the Historic Preservation Fund Committee; consultant Elaine Stiles produced the document.

During the reporting period, staff conducted research and drafted content for the **African American Historic Context Statement** that responds to comments received from community stakeholders and the public. On December 21, 2017, staff conducted an oral interview with Carl Williams, a board member of the African American Historical Society, as part of research for the document.

Also during the reporting period, staff received and reviewed 75% drafts of three National Register nominations prepared by consultants for the Department's **San Francisco Sites of Civil Rights Project**, funded by a National Park Service (NPS) Underrepresented Communities Grant. The three nominations are for: Glide Memorial Church, Japantown YWCA, and Gran Oriente Masonic Lodge and Hotel. The Department forwarded drafts to the NPS for its review and comment. NPS comments have since been provided to staff and consultants.

LANDMARK DESIGNATIONS (in progress/initiated)

During the reporting quarter, the following two Landmark Designations were approved:

- Third Baptist Church, 1399 McAllister Street, the HPC adopted a resolution on July 19, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on August 16, 2017, adopted a resolution recommending landmark designation to the BOS. The designation was introduced to the BOS on September 5, 2017 and heard by the Land Use and Transportation Committee (LCU) of the BOS on October 23, 2017. The LUC recommended its approval to the full Board. On October 31, the full Board passed the ordinance on its first reading, and finally passed it on its second reading held November 14, 2017. The ordinance was signed by the Mayor on November 15, 2017.
- Gaughran House, 2731-2735 Folsom Street, the HPC adopted a resolution on March 15, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on July 19, 2017, adopted a resolution recommending landmark designation to the BOS. The designation was introduced to the BOS on September 5, 2017 and heard by the LUC of the BOS on October 16, 2017. The LUC recommended approval to the full BOS. On November 28, 2017, the full BOS passed the ordinance on its first reading, and on December 5, 2017, finally passed the ordinance. The ordinance was signed by the Mayor on December 15, 2017.

Six additional designations were in progress during the reporting quarter, including:

- New Era Hall, 2117-2123 Market Street, the HPC adopted a resolution on December 7, 2016 to initiate landmark designation and on April 19, 2017, adopted a resolution to recommend landmark designation to the Board of Supervisors. On June 19, 2017, staff transmitted related documents to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. The item will be heard by the Land Use Committee of the Board of Supervisors at a future date yet to be determined.
- George Washington High School, 600 32nd Avenue, the HPC adopted a resolution on October 18, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on December 6, 2017 adopted a resolution to recommend landmark designation to the Board of Supervisors. The designation was transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2017.
- **Theodore Roosevelt Middle School, 460 Arguello Boulevard,** the HPC adopted a resolution on October 18, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on December 6, 2017 adopted a resolution to recommend landmark designation to the Board of Supervisors. The designation was transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2017.
- Sunshine School, 2728 Bryant Street, the HPC adopted a resolution on October 18, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on December 6, 2017 adopted a resolution to recommend landmark designation to the Board of Supervisors. The designation was transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2017.
- Diamond Heights Safety Wall, wall at the intersection of Diamond Heights Boulevard at Clipper Street, the HPC adopted a resolution on November 1, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on December 20, 2017 adopted a resolution to recommend landmark designation to the Board of Supervisors.
- Peace Pagoda & Peace Plaza, 1610 Geary Boulevard, the HPC adopted a resolution on June 21, 2017 to initiate landmark designation and on December 20, 2017 adopted a resolution to recommend designation to the Board of Supervisors.
- **Phillips Building, 236-246 1**st **Street**, the HPC adopted a resolution on December 6, 2017 to initiate landmark designation.

GRANT ACTIVITIES

On November 10, 2015, the Department was awarded a grant from the National Park Service for the **San Francisco Sites of Civil Rights Project**. Intended to study the theme of civil rights advancement in San Francisco and shed light on the stories of under-represented communities across the city, the two-year-long grant will allow staff to: prepare three National Register Nominations for properties with multi-racial and ethnic layers and associations: Glide Memorial Methodist Church, Japantown Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), and Gran Oriente Masonic Lodge. In addition, the project included the identification of sites associated with civil rights advances and struggles in San Francisco that were added to the Landmark Designation Work Program in 2016. The last component of the grant project involves the creation of an evaluative framework for sites associated with cultural heritage, which is being developed by staff working with student interns hired through the grant. During the reporting period, staff forwarded 75% drafts of the three National Register nominations and forwarded them on to the National Park Service for preliminary review as required by the grant contract. The Department received comments from the NPS, which have been provided to the consultants.

On August 29, 2017, the Planning Department was awarded a 2017-2018 Certified Local Government (CLG) Grant from the California Office of Historic Preservation for the production of a **Chinese American Experience in San Francisco Historic Context Statement**. The Chinese American Experience in San Francisco Historic Context Statement (Chinese American context) will address two critical historic preservation needs: 1) several previous efforts to document the Chinatown community in San Francisco have been successful; however, are not comprehensive and do not take into account contributions on a citywide scale, 2) there is currently no framework for evaluating the contributions, traditions, and practices of the Chinese-American Community reflected in the built environment. In preparation for the Citywide Historic Resources Survey, the framework developed through the context statement will allow for the identification of eligible properties in fulfillment of the City's preservation goals and objectives. The Chinese American Historical Society will serve as a community partner for the project and Architectural Resources Group will serve as project administrator. In October 2017 staff met with a consultant selected to serve as the study's lead author. During November and December 2017, staff reviewed and commented on a draft outline prepared by the consultant and held regular discussions with the author and the Chinese American Historical Society on the scope of the project and the schedule.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND COMMITTEE PROJECTS

Department Staff continue to work on the following Historic Preservation Fund Committee-funded, consultantproduced reports:

- African American Historic Context Statement (The item was posted to the website on January 6, 2016 and was expected to come before the HPC for adoption on February 17, 2016, the item was heard on March 16, 2016 and continued to October 2016, February 2017, August 16, 2017, and December 6, 2017. On December 6, 2017 it the item was continued indefinitely to allow staff to complete edits to the report and re-publish and distribute the revised document. Staff is currently making edits to the document in response to public comments received. Once the draft has been revised and re-distributed, staff will back to HPC for adoption.)
- Sacred Heart Parish Complex Landmark Designation Report (*The HPC initiated designation on October* 5, 2016. *The HPC granted continuances for recommendation on May* 17, 2017, July 19, 2017 and October 18, 2017 at the request of the property owners. The next hearing is scheduled for January 17, 2018.)
- **Residence Parks Historic Context Statement** (*Staff has completed its review of the final draft from the HPFC. At the request of the Department, Project sponsors conducted a community meeting in early August. It will come to the HPC at a future date yet to be determined*).
- **Eureka Valley Historic Context Statement** (*The final draft document was posted on the Department's website on May 10, 2017 and staff presented at a community meeting on July 10, 2017. The HPC adopted the context statement on December 20, 2017*).
- **Ocean Avenue Historic Resource Survey** (*The HPFC has provided funding for a consultant to complete the survey. On December 19, 2017 the Department received documentation for an Ocean Avenue Historic District from the consultant team.*)
- New Deal Era Historic Context Statement (On December 6, 2017, the HPC adopted resolutions recommending to the Board of Supervisors landmark designation of the three landmark designations associated with the project. Project consultants continue to work on the historic context statement which will come before the HPC at a future date.)
- San Francisco Latino Historic Context Statement (The project sponsor expects to submit a draft to the HPFC and Department in early 2018.)

OTHER LANDMARK DESIGNATION WORK PROGRAM ITEMS

Plaque Program. The Department received 39 applications for a historic landmark plaque. During the first phase of this pilot program, 25 individual landmark property owners will receive plaques. The remaining applicants have been placed on a waiting list to receive a plaque in the future as funding allows.

The Administrative Certificate of Appropriateness for 320 Judah Street (Doelger Building, Landmark No. 265) was approved by the Department on July 5, 2017 and the property owner has installed the plaque. Administrative Certificate of Appropriateness applications for 1338 Filbert Street (Filbert Street Cottages, Landmark No. 232) was approved on July 27, 2017. Administrative Certificate of Appropriateness for 2007 Franklin Street (Haas-Lilienthal House, Landmark No. 69) was approved on August 4, 2017.

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

This report also includes recently adopted performance measures to track Article 10 Landmark designations and Article 11 Changes of Designation. The goal of the following performance measures, along with other process-based improvements, is to present a clearer picture of the Department's work on the HPC's Landmark Designation Work Program.

A Performance Measures Report is not attached to this document. Due to the transition to the Department's new PPTS project tracking system, an accurate report could not be created. Past data cannot be accounted for, but Survey Team staff continues to work with the Finance team to develop a method for tracking this information for the current quarter.

1. Prepare and process individual Article 10 Landmark designations (from report to case closure) within staff 150 hours.

When this measure was established, the previous five individual Article 10 designations (Nos. 261-266) were within a range of 114 to 200 hours from the preparation of the report to the final Board of Supervisors hearing. While each designation is unique, Department preservation staff has set a goal to complete the average individual designation within 150 hours.

Staff time for the most recent 6 designations was:

- 115 hours for the Bourdette Building, No. 271
- 113 hours for the Alemany Health Building, Landmark No. 272
- 105 hours for Ingleside Presbyterian Church and *The Great Cloud of Witnesses,* Landmark No. 273
- 37 hours for the V.C. Morris Gift Shop.
- 74.75 hours for El Rey Theater
- 2. Prepare an Article 10/11 designation application outlining designation requirements, process, and fees by the end of the 2014 calendar year.

At the February 18, 2015 hearing, the HPC approved the Article 10/11 Designation Application. The application was uploaded to the Planning Department's website on April 6, 2015.

3. Provide comments to the applicant regarding the application's completeness and/or schedule HPC initiation hearings for all community/property-owner sponsored Landmark Designation Reports within 30 calendar days of receipt.

The Department will track performance and response time with owners and community members that submit nominations outside of the HPC's Work Program. The goal is to provide the HPC and the public with a timely response regarding requests for nomination submitted by the public. Tracking information will be included in the Performance Measures Report.

Two applications will be brought to the HPC once completed:

- <u>449 Fourteenth Street, Former Welsh Presbyterian Church</u> (received March 1, 2017, staff is awaiting final draft from sponsor)
- <u>6301 3rd Street, Arthur H. Coleman Medical Center</u> (received August 22, 2016, staff spoke with and provided written comments to applicant in October 2016. Since then, applicant has been in communication with applicant and tenant. After a pause in the project at the request of the tenant, staff met with tenant during the previous reporting

quarter and is in the process of conducting a series of oral interviews to help round out the application.)

4. Submit and present a Landmark Designation Work Program status report to the HPC every three months.

The next quarterly report will be presented to the HPC at its March 21, 2018 hearing.

LANDMARK DESIGNATION PROCESS

In order to provide the HPC and the public with a better understanding of the steps involved in landmark designation, the Department has developed a brief outline of the notification, hearings, and follow-up processes. Writing or reviewing a Landmark Designation Report is the first step in an expended process that involves multiple hearings and continuous property owner and stakeholder engagement, including:

- 1. Research and write Landmark Designation Report
- 2. Engage and notify property owner, tenants, district Supervisor, and other stakeholders
- 3. Write a Case Report and Resolution for HPC Initiation Hearing (Hearing #1)
 - a. Department presentation
- 4. Coordinate with the City Attorney to produce the legislative ordinance
- 5. Write a Memo and Resolution for HPC Recommendation Hearing (Hearing #2)
 - a. Department presentation
- 6. Produce required notification materials and newspaper ad per Planning Code Section 1004.2
- 7. Prepare submittal of materials to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors
- 8. Introduce at Board of Supervisors (Hearing #3)
- 9. Brief Supervisors and coordinate with Department's legislative liaison
- 10. Prepare materials for Board of Supervisors' Land Use Committee (Hearing #4)
 - a. Department presentation
- 11. First Read at Board of Supervisors (Hearing #5)
 - a. Department attends, available for questions
- 12. Second Read at Board of Supervisors (Hearing #6)
 - a. Department attends on a case-by-case basis
- 13. Mayoral signing (occasionally involves a signing ceremony)
- 14. Press release, website and Property Information Map updates
- 15. Prepare Notice of Special Restriction and file at the Assessor/Recorder's office
- 16. Formally notify the property owner and Office of Historic Preservation
- 17. Close case.




